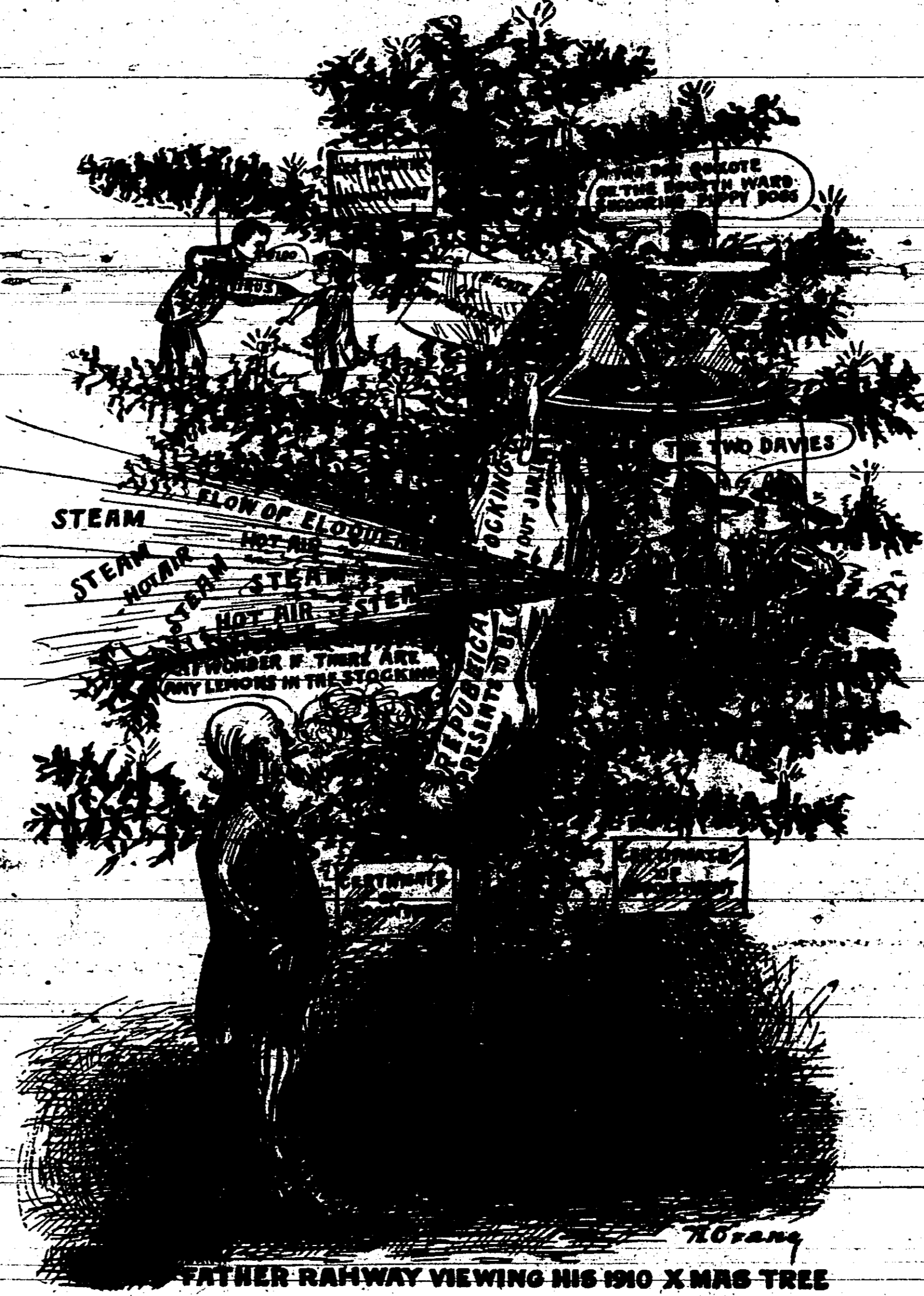
Population figures for all that could be obtained, but indicate a steady growth.
The National Census Bureau has finally decided to disclose its information regarding the population of Rahway and other New Jersey cities. The figures must have been determined some time ago, as the total population for the State was handed out for publication several weeks ago and the total figures could not have been available in advance of the figures for cities and counties. However, regardless of the delay, and regardless of the fact that the information was given to Newark and Elizabeth papers before it was given to the papers of our own city, it is gratifying to know that we are progressing faster than the city is at a standstill. Many who had hoped for a ten-thousand mark will be disappointed at the official report of 1910, but the delayed progress in population may be all the more marked in the next decade.
The natural advantages of location, railroad facilities and municipal improvements must count eventually when the commuting public becomes fully aware of them.
A Board of Health or other municipal organization to set the 20,000 mark and bend every energy to that end would mean much to Rahway, and now that it is known what neighboring communities have accomplished and what we have failed to accomplish, it is high time such a organization was perfected. Why not have a "vision" to set the goal and such a movement to stay forward at this time and take a hand?
If Rahway's advantages were known, the 20,000 mark would be some 500 high. To make it known should be considered a duty. It is a growth of 1,662, we should have a ten thousand increase by 1920.

The entertainment provided on holidays, and with considerable frequency at other times, are of a character to engage the boys in dignified games.
On Christmas day this year Dr. Moore was so fortunate as to secure Livingston Barbour, professor of Greek and English at Rutgers, to present character sketches from David Harum. Professor Barbour's depiction of the principal characters, Perkins, Aunt Polly, and Widow Culum drew rounds of applause from all his hearers, including the boys, and the visitors who were there by invitation of the Superintendent. To have read David Harum Westcott's popular and only novel, and then to have enjoyed the impersonations of Professor Barbour is a treat that would appeal to any audience, and the selection of this form of entertainment was most appropriate for the season, in view of the fact that the Christmas dinner at David Harum's home was the last section of the book placed in the hands of the audience.

It is interesting to note that among the prize winners is former Councilman J. Drumppelmann, now of Rahway Lake, New York. Mr. Drumppelmann's estimate was 11,000, which was 1,662 above the actual population. It is also noted that former Mayor L. High is not taking the same active part in Rahway affairs that he once did in his younger days, but it is well to note that he has not lost touch of his interest in the city and its progress. This he should have been able to make two months ago, when the contest was first announced. It is rather remarkable to say the least, that a prize was awarded to an official contributor to the News-Herald, as noted. In some of those who submitted their names, it is noted that they would have been sure winners, as they were starting from a very high point and finishing at intervals of 12 to 25 extra on each coupon. One estimate within the limits of the prize-winning figure would have been a winner if made on the coupon as stipulated. Unfortunately it was in the form of a letter and did not conform to the rules of the contest, as was shown out. It would have been unfair to the others to allow it to be counted when the others followed instructions exactly.
