The advance in wages in the United States has been brought about almost whally by labor unions and t makes one shudder to think of the deplorable condition labor would be in today if it had waited patiently for the capitalistic employer to do it justice. Voluntarily, employers have only in the rarest instances granted the reasonable demand of employes and one wonders by what system of logic the Baker Printing Company justifies its membership in the National Association of Manufacturers, while denying the right of tabor to organize for self-protection.
