When putting a new wall in a sixty-foot well at Winston-Salem, N. C., John Milton and Nelson Foster quarreled and engaged in a desperate fight.

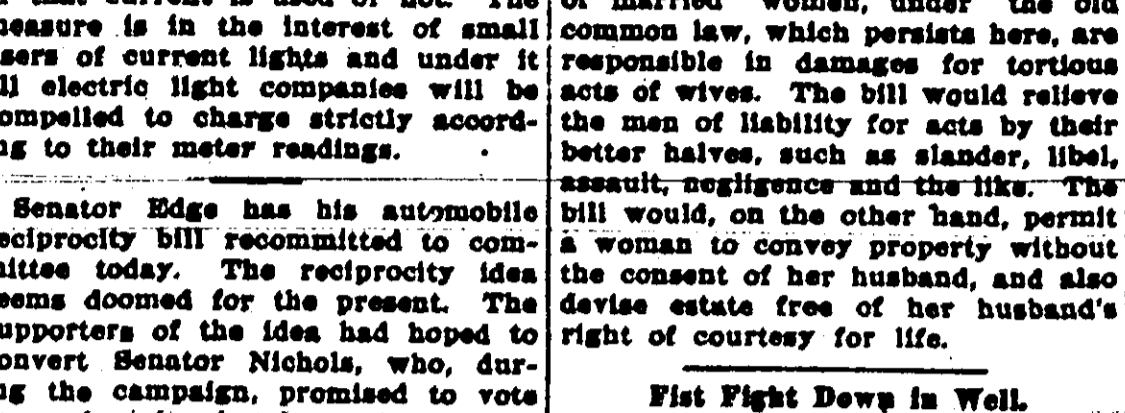

TO AVOID UNNECESSARY CRITICISM: Say Nothing—Do Nothing—Be Nothing.—From Elberton.

With hopes temporarily brightened by a magnificent speech made on behalf of Lorimer by Senator Bailey, of Texas, the lumber trust, the railroad and Standard Oil are making a desperate final effort to save the Illinois boss from expulsion.

It is very doubtful, however, if Lorimer can be saved. Whatever it is to do is in the way of extracting or forcing senators to stand for Lorimerism with the most complete indifference to the rights of the people.

The lumber trust, represented by Edward Hines, millionaire Chicago lumberman, has been the boldest in its operations in the vicinity of the Senate, but the railroad lobby has been quite as active, although less obstinate.

George R. Peck, of Chicago, general counsel of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway, is probably the most prominent of the railroad representatives working for Lorimer. Peck is probably better acquainted with more individual senators than any other professional or business man in the whole country.

The interest of the railroads in Lorimer is well known in the political world. W. C. Brown, president of the New York Central, is a director of the La Salle Street National Bank, the financial institution founded by Engel.

President Van's influence is being exerted against Lorimer. Speaker Cannon is working to save Lorimer by their line-up for and against him the leading men at the capitol can be easily classified.

That the gratuitous insults flung at the special committee appointed by the Council to take up the question of track elevation were entirely out of place and unjust is shown by the most expeditious and conscientious efforts they have put forth and the results they have accomplished in so brief a space of time.

At Sedalia, Mo., an allopathic physician who was a member of the Board of Education, caused to be issued by that board an order that he should be removed from the public school and the school authorities were forced to secure an injunction and in the trial was assisted by the lower court in accordance with the decision of the Supreme Court of Illinois, to the effect that "a healthy child is not a menace to the community."

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EXTRACT FROM "A PROTEST" BY PROFESSOR LEWIS PINKERTON CUTCHER, OF THE HARVARD MEDICAL COLLEGE, OF KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI.

This I am prompted to say by the fact that the allopathic profession and the American Medical Association have been notoriously guilty of disregarding the prevention of disease when such procedure showed a tendency to contradict preconceived medical opinions with which they were primarily and fundamentally imbued and which they were determined to maintain in this state by the history of compulsory vaccination and its relationship to the allopathic school of medicine, for it is evident to me that any plan for the prevention of disease that does not contain a specification for judicious use of no interest to the allopathic school, and that we therefore forced to the conclusion that the prevention of disease in its truest and best sense finds its proper home in the hands of those of the medical profession, I need only to call your attention to the fact that at first vaccination as a preventive measure was "recommended" to the people, and that later, when the people seemed to have lost what faith they may have had in the efficacy, the cherub organizations of the allopathic school stealthily approached the various state legislatures and burdened the peoples of the several states with enactments fostering the compulsion of this peculiar practice. In my own city, when the public schools opened, in the fall of 1909, for the purpose of discharging the duty of that community which it owes to education each was able to accept, an allopathic physician very blithely announced through the public press that he would immediately set about to vaccinate every child in that city regardless of their parents' religious opinions, medical convictions, or previous condition of health. It was my pleasure as well as my duty to announce in the next issue of the same papers that the city physician would not vaccinate any child in that community without the full written consent of that child's parent or parents. Before it was possible for me to secure the injunction the allopathic physician of public health had effected the vaccination of several children, one of whom promptly died, and another suffered the amputation of his arm, after which his infection became unnecessary, and no reference has been made since that time to vaccination by physicians in Kansas City. I might add that neither has there been any epidemic of smallpox nor any condition simulating it ad interim.

A news item elsewhere in this issue recounts the action taken against a physician at Philadelphia because of his failure to comply with the state law which requires a registration of all births. The doctors of Rahway are notoriously lax in this matter and it is to be regretted that they are helpless in its effort to enforce the law. In a recent instance the case of one of the doctors was referred to the State Board of Health for their attention.

COMMISSION PLAN PROGRESS.

Among the New Jersey cities which have taken the initiative to reorganize their government up for serious consideration—there are now quite a string of them. It is only natural to expect all sorts of objections. Two of the most recent come from decidedly different quarters. One comes from a politician whose interests have been tangled with the public utility corporations. He calls the commission plan the first step toward socialism. The other comes from a socialist. He calls the plan a desertion of democracy for plutocracy.

Now it is certain that the commission government can't be both. As a matter of fact it is neither. It is merely a device copied from the organization of the most efficient business concerns for getting several efficiency in city government. It aims to get that efficiency in the same way as a business concern does—by putting the responsibility for each department of the city squarely up to one man.

It simply assures them that they can put whomsoever they want in charge of any department of the city's business, and out exactly who is responsible for any department that is not conducted the way they want it to be, and get out of the government the man responsible for anything they don't like, without any question of whether he is responsible or not—the responsibility is on himself. It is not the responsibility of the commission government to him, but it is on his own shoulders.
