8.958 re-vaccinated soldiers in the British army suffered from smallpox during 1860-1888, of whom **391 died** of the disease—See Royal Commission, second report, p.

674 American Soldiers in our Philippine army suffered from smallpox in 1898-1901. and 249 died of it. Re-vaccination was performed with the regularity of the drills. Prussia was the best re-vaccinated country in Europe, and its mortality from smallpox in the epidemic of 1871 was higher (69.839) than in any other northern state. ---(See Britannica) In 1871-2 Berlin had 17.038 vaccinated cases, with 2.884 deaths,-Alfred Miles, M.

After 18 years of compulsory vaccination. England lost 44,809 persons by smallpox in the years 1871-2. The London Lancet said in 1871 that "more than 122,000 vaccinsted persons had suffered from smallpox in England."

Japan has had compulsory vaccination for the past 23 years, and the official statistics show that from 1889 to 1909 there were 171.611 cases of smallpox with 47.919 deaths. In 1908 there were 18,067 cases with 5.887 deaths-32 per cent., mortality! This is nearly double the mortality from smallpox during the middle of the 18th cen-tury before vaccination was "discovered," when people lived in ignorance and filth.

Two-thirds of our states have no compulsion. The Supreme Court of Illinois declared compulsory vaccination of school children illegal, in April. 1908, and said that a healthy child was no "menace" to anybody, and could not be excluded from the scappla on account of non-vaccination. There is no compulsory vaccination of school children in England.

Vaccination is the most far-reaching and despicable seands that the world has ever known. It was born in ignorance and carried on by lies. Now it is a great disease grafting industry which is a shame and disgrace to our age and civilization. It is an outrage on Nature and a crime against Hu manity.
