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

IT IS LEGAL TO LOANERKINE.

The Senate of the United States, which is the highest and most dignified law-making body in the Republic, set examples in justice and wisdom for all the people of the nation to emulate, has held that it is legal to loanerkin.

The Senators who voted to admit there was bribery, but hold that loanerkin is still entitled to his seat because it was not shown that he personally was implicated in any act or acts of bribery.

Here is a simile to the case on which the Senate has placed its stamp of approval.

Suppose a man serving in a state legislature or in the lower branch of congress shows himself willing to represent the interests of a certain trust. Suppose he becomes a candidate for the United States Senate. The trust believes that if elected the candidate will continue to take its orders.

When the Senator arrives in Washington, the Senate investigates and returns a verdict of "Flee! You're one of us!"

This may be a good system for the trust, and for the Senator, too! But doesn't it seem a little of a joke of representative government and the people?

In all our history there never was a closing of congress with so many dramatic incidents as the one just ended. The sudden resignation of Senator Bailey, the personal threats against Speaker Cannon, the refusal of Senator Cramer to see the President who was waiting for him in a private room at the Capitol and the objection to the unanimous adoption of the customary resolution commending the Vice-President for his courtesy and consideration.

The idea of those who framed the law permitting municipalities to have an appellate Board of Education was that it would insure the selection of men above the average in intelligence, who would not allow their names to be used if they must pass through the throes of an election. It was never expected nor intended that a legislative Board should do those things which they would not dare to do, if elected. There is not a man in the present Board of Education who could be elected to the office in the face of the present feeling against the Board.

The list of names published elsewhere in this edition of the News-Herald will cause the interest of those parents who have a "wonder" if the names of their children have been properly recorded at the office of the City Clerk as provided by law. The difficulty has been that the doctors have thought themselves above the law and have, until recently, refused to comply with the rules made for their guidance in this matter, until they were threatened by the authorities, and even now it is said that one physician refuses to make his returns. This is a matter of great importance to parents, as their names are frequently required to determine the proper amount of support. If any names have been omitted from the list the parents should require their physician to make a report without further delay to insure a proper record on the Clerk's books.

The calling of the extra session of congress for April 1, will give to the legislative branch control of the five hundred house offices after that date. The account for the three leading offices, Clerk, Sergeant and Sergeant-at-Arms, is still undecided, and will remain so up to the caucus. These offices are of great importance, and the appointment and removal of the holders of these offices is a matter of great importance to parents, as their names are frequently required to determine the proper amount of support. If any names have been omitted from the list the parents should require their physician to make a report without further delay to insure a proper record on the Clerk's books.

It is worth noting that in proportion as publishers have been discredited, the public has been more ready to believe the "rumor-mongers" who have been so successful in their efforts to discredit the publishers. It is a sad state of affairs, and one which should be of great concern to all who are interested in the welfare of the public.

The Governor's optimism is easily explained. There are two things that he knows well. One is the soundness of his own position. The other is that the masses of the people will always respond to an honest appeal to the sense of right.

Thus, in the case of the German bill, he knows that because it is a good bill the people will appreciate it and support it, if they are rightly appealed to. He simply puts the fight up to the people, and has no fear of the consequence. In the two former cases his confidence was derived from the same source.

Governor Wilson disclosed his absolute confidence in the integrity and power of the common people of his State at Hoboken Thursday evening. He addressed the people from that platform and failed to understand why it is that he has absolute confidence in the common people of his State.

The Governor said, among other things: "I have a very profound belief in the common people of this State. I believe that they will support a good cause, and I believe that they will support a good man."
