INSURRECTOS PUT DEMANDS TO DIAZ

San Antonio, Tex., March 20.—That all political refugees in the United States shall be permitted to return to Mexico freely and to participate in all elections of every revolutionary shall be allowed to take his rifle and ammunition home with him without molestation will be the demands of the insurgents of the Mexican government, as conditions upon which peace may be negotiated. With this must come a guarantee from the cabinet ministers of Diaz that they pledge themselves to see that the peace pact is carried out. Only on such a condition, according to information direct from the field, will the insurgents consider a cessation of hostilities. They will absolutely refuse to lay down their arms, but will retain with the idea of taking them up again at any time the government breaks faith. With these reforms as a basis of negotiation the United States General Diaz will resign the presidency and return to his home in Mexico. The insurgents will then return to their homes and give the new government a fair trial. Picking in the state of Chihuahua has caused, and all the insurgents are now in the hands of the federal army. They can discuss terms with federal forces.

Mr. Underwood believes that because of the similarity of the people of the two countries, and other reasons which have a tendency to make reciprocity mutually desirable, there is no more reason why there should be a tariff wall between the United States and Canada than there would be for a tariff wall between Vermont and New Hampshire, or any other two adjoining states of the Union.

Speaking for myself alone said Mr. Underwood. I am in favor of adding a clause to the reciprocity agreement authorizing the President, by executive act, to reduce the tariff duties of this country, on any item, whether included in the Canadian agreement or not, whenever Canada is willing to open to them on her free list.

It is almost certain the Democratic House will pass the extra session, several bills relating the tariff downward on particular schedules, in addition to the reciprocity act. They will do this regardless of intimation from the White House that the President will veto any tariff legislation that is not based on the results of a so-called expert investigation by men appointed by President Taft.

All of the members of the Democratic Ways and Means Committee, with the exception of two, Underwood and Hammond, voted against a bill to create a tariff board at the last session of Congress, and it is virtually certain they will refuse to act favorably on the President's suggestion that the much-needed downward revision be based on the findings of the Republican-appointed board.

The Democratic do not intend to relax their right and left, with a reckless hand, but they propose to frame legislation that will meet the expectations of the people, and will be in compliance with promises made in the last campaign.

The terrible calamity in New York, accompanied by the loss of 195 lives, and the burning of the "Fireproof" Capitol at Albany again emphasize the necessity for fire escapes on the school and factory buildings in Rahway. Some department of our city government must be responsible for attention to this most important matter.
