MARY

Mary is the Hebrew form of the Greek name Miriam, variously translated "Rebellion," or "Full of bitterness," the exact meaning, however, remaining in dispute.

Modern writers, particularly the American and English, claim authority for translating Mary as "The Exalted One," which seems acceptable, in view of the fact that so many women were named Mary by royal parents.

In religion, chief of all is the Virgin Mary, who was of the tribe of Judah and of the royal lineage of David.

Mary Chaucer, immortalized in Byron's poem, "The Dream," was the poet's first love. Her husband Mary was the youthful love of Burns, and the subject of his famous songs, "Will You Go to the Ladies, My Mary?" "Ye Hanks and Hanks of Bonnie Bessie," and "Thou Linnetwing Bird."

Spanish Queens bearing this name are Mary I., sometimes called "Bloody Mary," Mary of Modena, the Queen of James the Second, and Mary II, who jointly ruled Scotland with King William III.

The first of the Scottish royal Marys was Mary of Guise, the wife of James the sixth and mother of the famous Mary Stuart.

In France there was Marie-Therese, wife of the Grand Monarque, Marie Lezarskna, the consort of Louis XV, Marie-Anthoinette and Marie-Louise, the second wife of the great Napoleon.

Marie Theresia was Empress of Austria and the mother of Joseph II, the last to rule as Emperor of the Western Roman Empire.

Marie Joseph, last Queen of Naples, now keeps a lace store in Paris. Next name, "Molly."

The chorus came from aviary filled by Mr. Hubbard, who was a collector of birds of rare plumage and song.

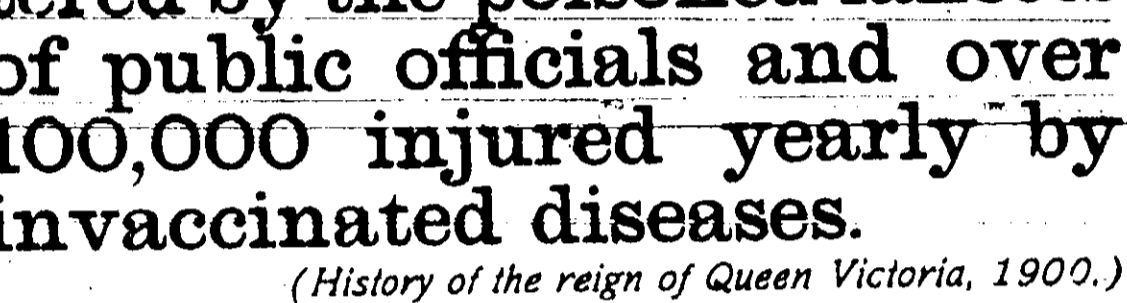

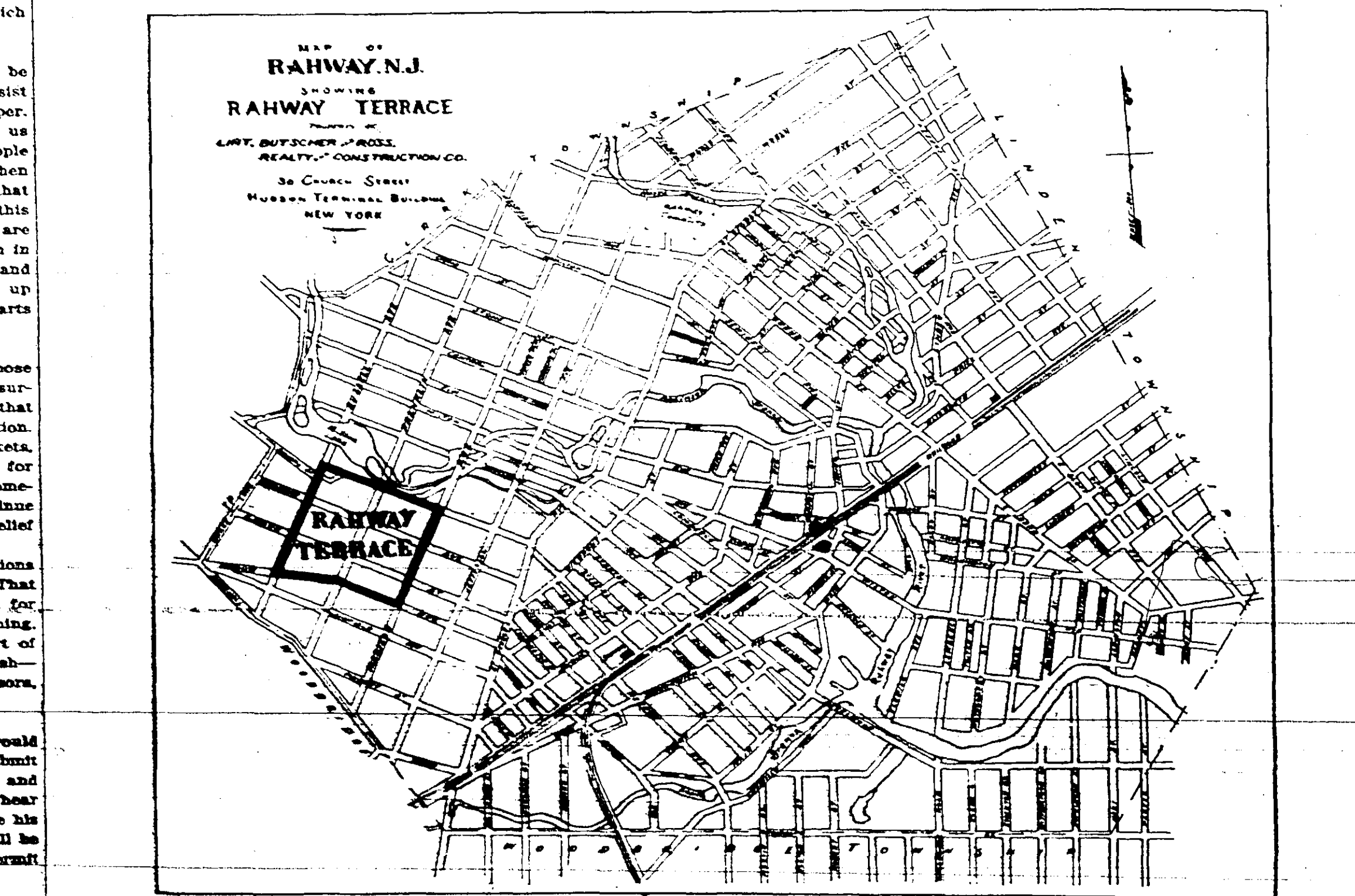

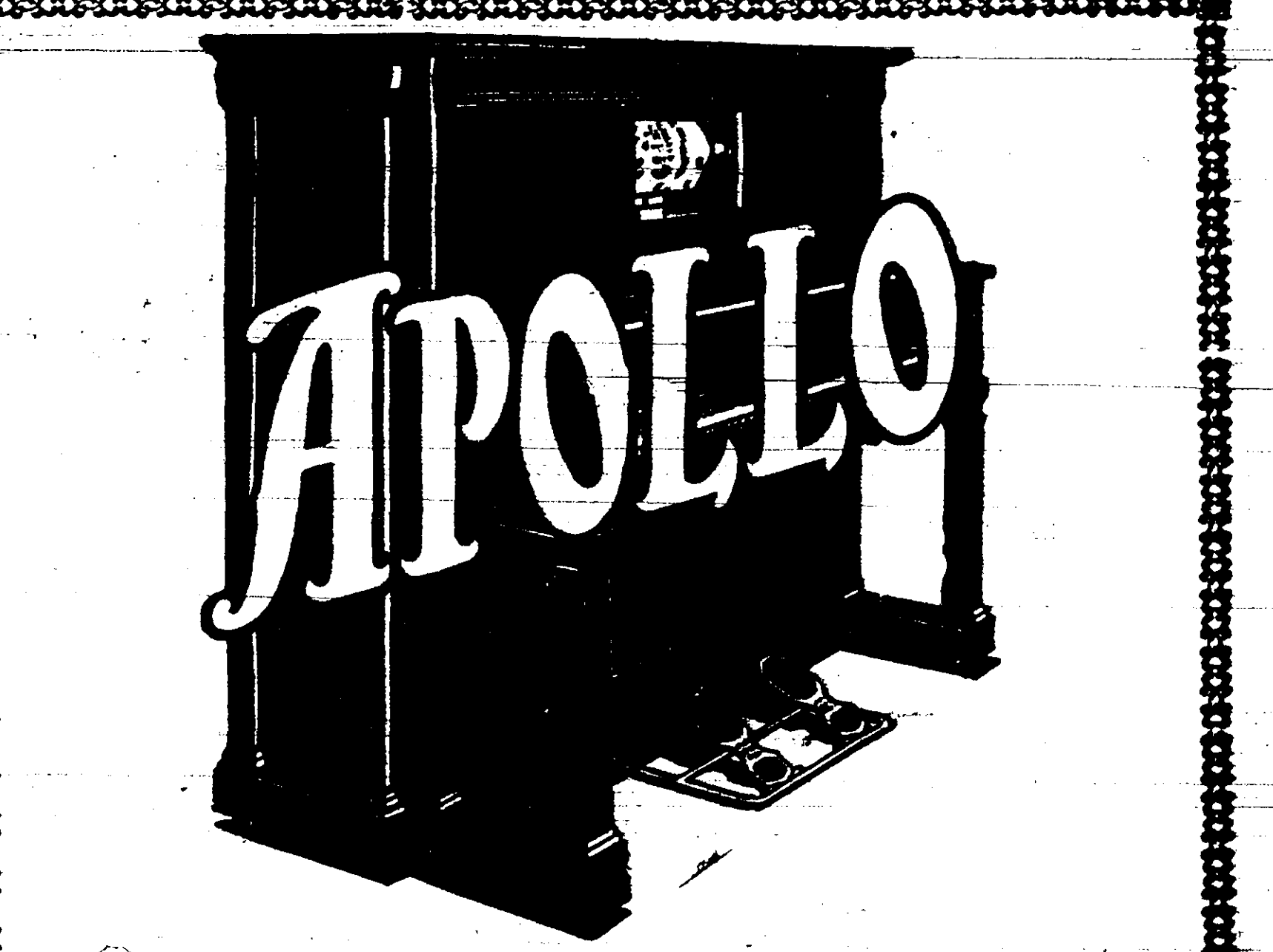

**PROVISIONS OF GERAN MEASURE**

(Continued From Friday.)

**Personal Registration.**  
In section 11 it is provided that in municipalities of more than 5,000 to substitute a personal registration shall be required and no registration by affidavit shall be allowed. The first registration day therein shall be on Thursday two weeks next preceding the general election. Directions for arranging the registry books in these municipalities of over 5,000 are also given. The leaves of the book shall be numbered from A to Z.

In the first column there shall be entered a number opposite each name at the completion of the registration on the first day. In the second and third columns the surname and Christian name respectively. In the fourth column the number and in the fifth the street of the voter's residence. In the sixth column the number of the floor or room occupied. In the seventh column the full name of the householders, tenant, subtenant or apartment keeper with whom the voter resides. In the eighth column the voter's age. In the ninth his length of residence by years in the state. In the tenth the country of his nativity. In the eleventh the name of the municipality from which he last voted or voted. In the twelfth the voter's full name for himself or with others the name under which he is so in business or the name of his present employer. If he is not in business and has no employment "none" shall be entered the name under which he was last in business or the name of his last employer.

**"Signature Copy."**  
These statements must be signed as true by the voter and shall be known as "signature copy." If the voter cannot write one of the board shall take down his answers to these questions: "What is your father's full name? Your mother's full name? Are you married or single? Where did you actually reside immediately prior to taking up your present residence? State floor and character of the premises."

These are to be known as identification statements for registry day, and the county clerk shall furnish five copies of them to the chief of police of the municipality to ascertain if the statements are true.

The chief's reports are to be kept for public inspection. In the event of municipalities of over 5,000 similar questions are to be signed by the voter and the signatures compared. If the signatures appear to be the same a member of the board shall so certify in the poll book.

If the voter says he cannot read he is to be asked the questions he was asked when he registered and the answers compared. Any one who prompts him in these answers shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. This proceeding shall be in full view of the challengers and watchers who shall have the right to challenge. If the majority of the board decides against receiving the vote the voter shall swear it in.

**Arrest of Voters.**  
Upon the demand of a member of the board or any other citizen the board shall issue forthwith a warrant for the voter and deliver it to any peace officer, who shall forthwith arrest the voter. Transfers must be secured from the supreme court justice or the circuit or county judge of the county. In section 12 the ballot is described and directions for voting it given.

There shall be furnished to each election board twice as many official ballots for use of the voters in the polling places on election day as there are voters registered in said election district.

The same provision is made for the printing of the official sample ballots and mailing one to each registered voter as in the case of the sample ordinary ballots.

Section 13 provides the method of voting. Each voter shall first give his full name and address and shall sign the poll book. If found to be registered he shall be given a ballot numbered to correspond to the voter's number

on the poll book allowing for spoiled ballots, if any. The ballot shall be folded so that no part of its face is observable. The voter shall then retire to the booth and prepare his ballot by placing an X in black ink or black pencil opposite the name of the candidate for whom he wishes to vote. Before leaving the booth the voter must fold his ballot so that no part of its face is visible and so as to display the face of the numbered coupon. The member of the board having charge of the ballot box shall tear off the numbered coupon and place the ballot in the box and the coupon on a string. The ballot shall be kept in full view of the voter and the election board until it is deposited in the box, and the voter may take hold of it until it is actually deposited in the box.

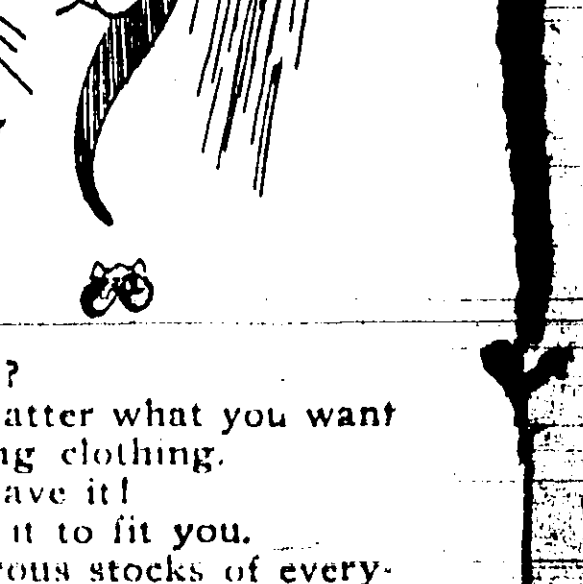
