

If one were about to perform some important service for a manufacturing corporation and took occasion to demand certain concessions in return, it would not interest him to know that the corporation affairs were so divided nta departments that the one with which he was dealing could not settle the question. He would say-'get your department heads together and settle the matter and let me know your decision." He would not perform the services until they did so. It does not interest the people of Rahway to know that Superintendent Sheppard has nothing to do with time cards. If he has no influence with the passenger department it is no affair of our Council. Council never asked for the privilege of dealing with Superintendent Sheppard or the engineering department. They approached Rahway to secure an ordinance. If they want it they will be reasonable in every particular as they have been in some. It is more than fair for them to say they cannot leave Poplar street open (which they had intended to close) and also pay for rightof-way to open Monroe street. It seems only fair that it should be allowed to use a sod embankment where walls are not needed when it has purchased all the property required for that particular purpose.

But it is not fair to say that it cannot consider the question of train service. Train service is all-important to every citizen of Rahway. We want to get to the Shore and return as conveniently as the people of Elizabeth. We

We want the right when a ticket has been purchased to Philadelphia o some point beyond, to get there without buying an extra ticket and going is the opposite direction, to Elizabeth or Newark, to take a train. These privi legge we have tried to secure for years only to be treated courteously and committees sent home with promises,-nothing but promises and statements that the service to the people of Rahway interfered with the through trains and was therefore unprofitable. It is more important now, and always has been, to get passengers through from New York to Chicago and vice-versa than to help our people get in and out of town comfortably. What do we care that the railroad company has a passenger department? That's its business and organized for its convenience exclusively. As suggested by Commissioner Plum, the passenger agent can come on to Rahway and discuss the matter if he chooses but some one with authority should take up the question of train service new-new before the ordinance is passed. It will-never be done later and after the ordinance becomes a law the company can anap Its fingers in our face and we can go on as before with the same old inconveniences. Any councilman who hampers the committee in its efforts to secure every possible concession from the railroad at this time will be morally responsible for the loss to the city and there is absolutely not one thing to


