Excise Commissioners of the City That Title II. Section 3, first paragraph, of the "Code of Ordinances of the Board of Excise Commissioners of the City of Rahway, regulating the sale of spirituous, vinous, malt, brewed, distilled or fermented liquors, and to establish regulations for the granting, transfer and revocation of licenses, and for the imposition of penalties for the violation of the provisions of this "code of ordinances," be amended so as to read as

Section 3. Paragraph 1. Class 1 Shall be applied to and be issued for the sale at any inn or tavern, hotel, refectory, saloon, restaurant, or other place spirituous, vinous, or other liquors in any quantities.
