

As a matter of fact, however, this immunity often is nurchased at too dear a price. All three of these diseases are frequently followed by injurious after-effects. Scarlet fever may result in deafness or in the impairment of heart or kidneys; measles not infrequently is followed by injuries to sight or hearing; and all three leave behind a fertile field for the seeds of bronchitis, pneumonia, and tuberculosis." Not a one of the ill after-effects of measles and scarlet fever but follow almost with certainty in the trail of the vaccine injection; the only difference being that the ill effect is almost certain to follow and that there is no limit to the number of diseases following vaccination. Deliberate poisoning of the blood in childhood cannot fall ultimately to weaken the system in its effort to

couraged in its ravages. Dr. Mayo further says: "Bronchitis and pneumonia cause three times a many deaths in children under two years of age as at any other age period. Tuberculosis also claims many child victims. In the Babies' Hospital in New York, ten per cent of all the deaths are due to tuberculosis." All doctors concede, as does Dr. Mayo, the increasing deaths from other diseases, of small children and then ignore the fact that these other diseases are caused by vaccine injections. Tuberculosis is known to be one of the terrible results of vaccination, and the appalling increase of the dreaded "white plague," and of cancer, can be accounted for in no other way than that they are caused by this adhorrent practice. Granting, for the sake of argument, that vaccination may have prevented some cases of small-pox, is it profitable, measured by human lives, to save ten children from small-pox and kill ten hundred by tuberculosis? Statisticians for the pro-vaccinists always leave out the creasing deaths of children from other diseases and also ignore the improved sanitary conditions when they prepare their tables of mortality from smallpox. Senitation, isolation and improved living conditions will stamp out any plague and will not cause other diseases as bad or worse than the affliction. There is yet to appear a single defense of vaccination that does not unconsciously admit the evils of the practice and Dr. Mayo, like the rest, has fallen into the same unconscious admission.

The Medical Record, an organ of the Allopaths, in defense of vaccination on April 15, 1911, says: "In 1906, George Dock pointed out the fact that of 2,000 patients that had been admitted to his wards in Michigan only 60 per cent, had been vaccinated." If 60 per cent, were vaccinated how did it happen they were admitted to the small-pox ward? How did they become afflicted when they were immunized?

The article further states: "School authorities place themselves in the anomalous attitude of compelling vaccination in early life, but practically ignoring the necessity of this procedure at a later age. If a child has been vaccinated when one year old it is admitted to school at the age of six. but a few years later its immunity to smallpox may have vanished.
