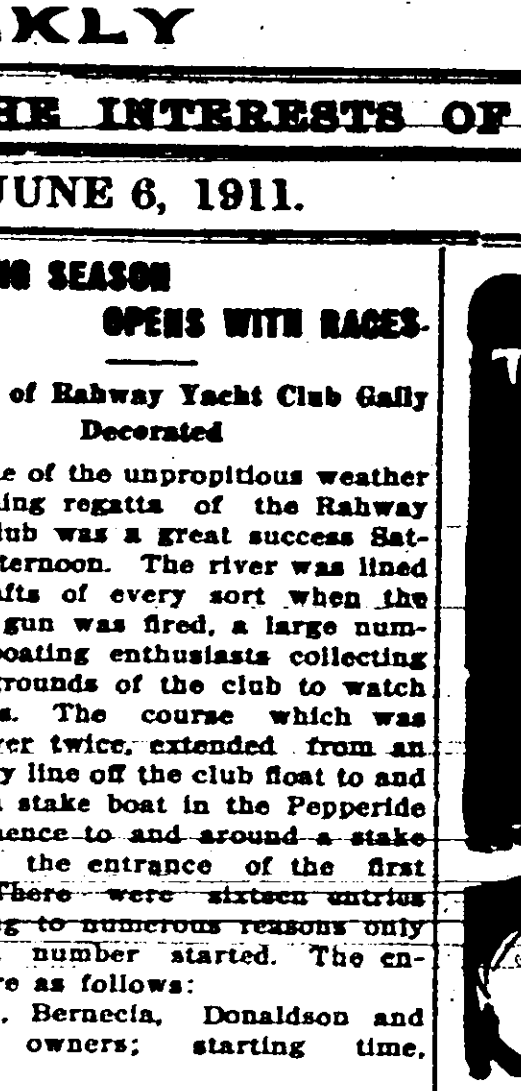

POLITICS AND JOURNALISM.

By H. J. Johnson of the Minnesota Maroon.
The country editor should not be in politics—that is to say, he should not have any personal interest in politics. He should not be a candidate for office. The result of the election of one candidate or another should not mean either profit or loss to the man who guides or governs an organ of public opinion.

An editor, if he is to be able to do his full duty as a newspaper man, must neither seek nor accept office. Every office sought, every office accepted, becomes a snare on the public organ that the editor is trying to run. Even a little county office has a multitude of strings attached to it, and the country editor who accepts one of these offices soon finds that he has surrendered a good deal of his independence. He cannot any longer "jump on top" of the county commissioner for foolish expenditures of public funds. The commissioner has political influence, and the editor-politician needs it. He must therefore wink the other eye and let the little leaks go unnoticed. He cannot criticize the state of affairs in the other offices in the county, because the men holding those offices are fellow officials, and it would be extremely rude to say anything against the men with whom one is so closely associated.

The position of an editor and his duties toward the community and the state are such that he cannot effectively or to the best advantage fulfill his mission and hold public office at the same time. The reporter, the editors, the newspaper makers, are the men who hold the mirror up to the public and show it where things are right and where they are wrong. In order to do their duty impartially the newspaper men must be unhampered. They must not be interested in abridging this man or accusing that. Their work will be done without fear and without favor. The newspaper man is, after all, somewhat of a machine. He has to take things as he finds them. He has to tell things as he sees them. He must relate facts as they present themselves. This he can best do by not being hampered by an official tie.

The newspaper man must be in the midst of the political turmoil that surrounds him, but he must also be detached from that turmoil. He must be able to see and understand the workings of the political machinery, and he must be able to point out the dangers that threaten the body politic. In order to do this he must take an unbiased view of things and have free hands in dealing with the problems that confront him. It is more important that an industrial newspaper be in the hands of a good man than that this or that public office be properly conducted. The people can always take care of the official who does not do his duty, but the newspaper man who is corrupt or dishonest in his dealings with the public is harder to get at. Public sentiment will oust the official, but the editor has a hundred ways of hanging on.

There is probably no department of journalism where the temptation to color and misrepresent is as strong as it is in that of politics. It is easy to color things to favor one's own point of view when dealing with political subjects that one must be very careful not to yield to the temptation. Distorted journalism has its rewards. Men whose convictions are for sale, if their influence is worth anything, can find a ready buyer. The largest bribe on record, several millions of dollars, was made to a New York newspaper man and refused. The newspaper man who is willing to conceal, cover up or misstate facts for a consideration can generally find a market for his cupidity, but such success is generally not lasting, and the newspaper man who sells himself into the service of dishonesty, be it political or commercial, comes but the loser in the end despite temporary successes.

We frequently hear the opportunity of this or that profession discussed. The opportunities of journalism lie not in what the profession offers the man engaged in it as returns for his labors, but rather in the chance it gives him to be of service to his fellow men. The position of editor, even that of country editor, is a responsible one. His relation to the community in which he lives and works is peculiar. He can exercise an influence for good or ill out of all proportion to his material powers—this simply because he controls a medium that conveys impressions to the public mind. Many men enter politics—and I mean by that officiating—through the avenue of journalism. Some go into newspaper work just because they think that it is the proper stepping stone to officiating. Such men are not journalists; they are not newspaper men; they are merely office seekers. The newspaper man who forsakes his profession for the fickle mistress of politics quits a noble calling to get in many instances a questionable job. Of course a newspaper man must be more or less in politics all the time. There is no avenue of life, no place or condition of human activity, to which he can afford to be a stranger. He must, to be true to his calling, take an inventory of his community or his best every day, and there is nothing that is not worthy of his attention. But this watchfulness on the part of the press is especially essential in the field of politics. The newspaper man must keep an ever vigilant eye on the politicians, for it is to the press that the people look for news of men to "keep in the circles of politics."

During the time when the NEWS-HERALD was agitating the question of a higher excise license for in Rahway it was said that those who favored the lower license were in the majority. This is not the case. The NEWS-HERALD has not yet received a license. It is now rumored that the rough element of the first department proposed some similar action as a response to our charges of last week which the superintendent and licensed members of the fire companies know to be true and which they have admitted before witnesses to be true. Such action on the part of the fire department has no other effect than to assist in convincing the public that our statements were based upon facts which can easily be proven in the court of public opinion or a court of law. Such members of the fire department as Supt. Kratoch, Chief Toms, James McCollum, Sidney Harris, David Kennedy and others of that character are not the ones who will take exception to our statement of facts—all of which was for the benefit of the city. We have no personal axe to grind as the editor of this paper was at one time made an honorary member of one of the fire companies and has nothing but the most friendly feeling for those who answer alarms to fight fire instead of loose and who do not spend their time turning the hose on rival companies instead of the fire.

We adhere to our original statement that a fire department has no business in politics, and for any part of the city government to be adjusted to suit the firemen is a gross abuse of power. If a paid department can be substituted for a volunteer department to the advantage of property owners it should be done. No volunteer department could have such a discussion more than that it should in the matter of track elevation where the interests of the entire city are at stake. Firemen should not forget that it was an official of the volunteer department who was recently arrested and convicted for cutting in false alarm and there were many who thought the same party guilty of setting the numerous fires of the second ward. In any event the fire in that section have been very serious since that conviction. When the department is purged of its corrupt and unscrupulous members it may answer up to the demand of the city, but in the meantime, the crowd which opposes the publication of the truth may be told that their threats to burn the character of the NEWS-HERALD editor or blow up some public property with dynamite will have no effect whatsoever on our policy. If they must find it necessary to use that kind of argument to answer the charges, we have nothing to say except that we are carrying out our original promise to the people of Rahway, that we will not flinch in our fight against the corrupt element of the fire department. The attitude of some of the firemen in this matter is much like that of the crowd on the occasion of the annual appropriation to the department when they stated: "Council will give us that money tonight or we'll show 'em!" They are accustomed to making threats but it does not add to their popularity nor for the good opinion the public may hold of them.

In closing we might add that, back in 1906, a few intemperate saloonkeepers set the boycott scheme and it has cost them a few dollars a night. That is how some week-end merchants would respond to the request of a lot of booze ligers to discontinue ads. in the NEWS-HERALD. The NEWS-HERALD will continue to issue on Tuesdays and Fridays as heretofore and the editor will be in his office during the usual business hours.

Morristown Civic Association Names Committee to Consider Adaptability.

MORRISTOWN, June 1.—The first step toward obtaining a commission form of government for Morristown was taken today when the Morristown Civic Association named a committee to consider the adaptability of such a form of government for the town. The committee is headed by Mayor Theodore A. Myers and includes several prominent citizens.
