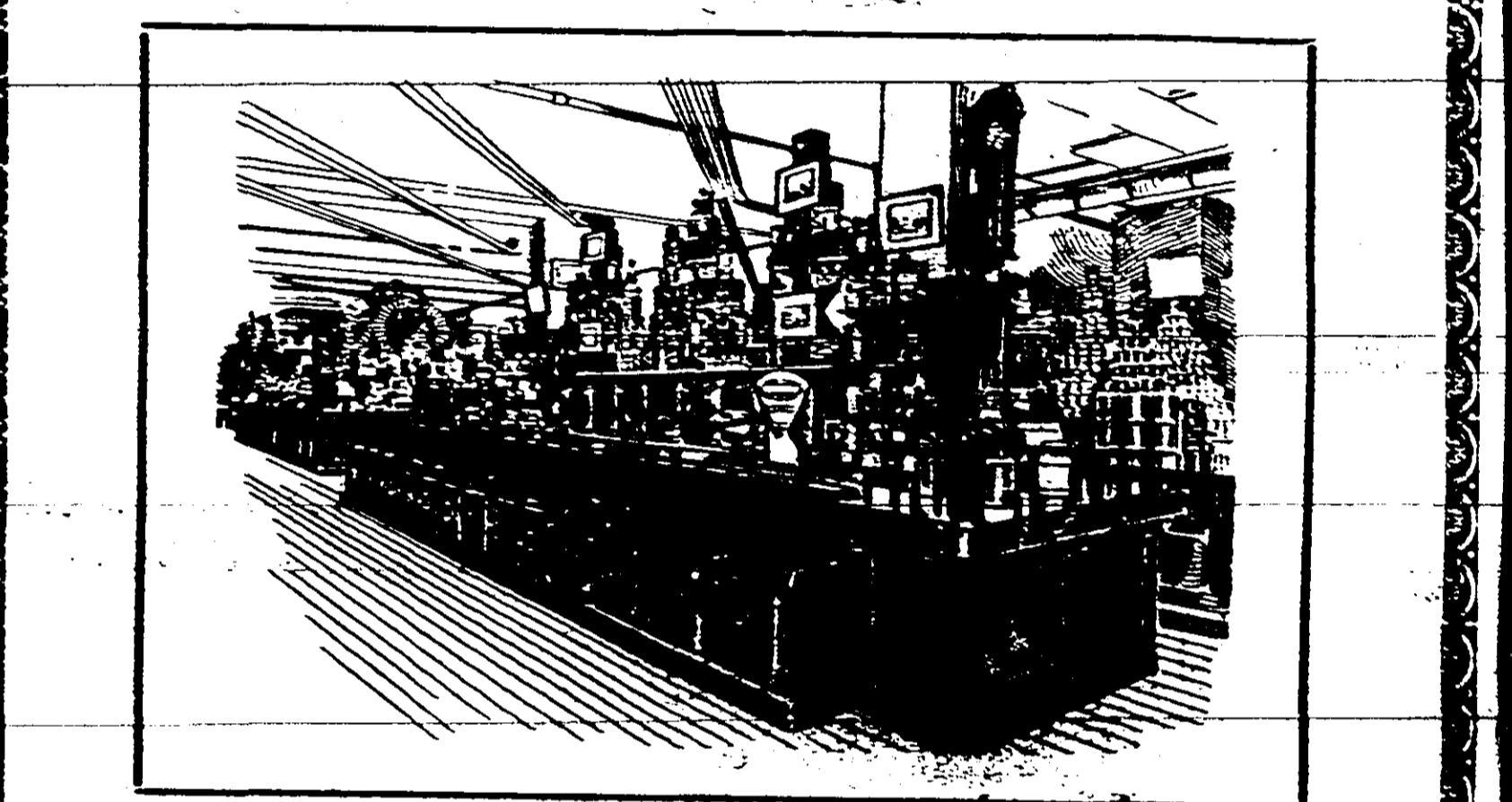

In the junior twenty-five yard swim on back, Oscar Garbawitz managed to kick just a little harder than his opponent and won by a very narrow margin in the unlimited fifty yard swim on back, Macclary led Blone at the finish, with Austin a close third.

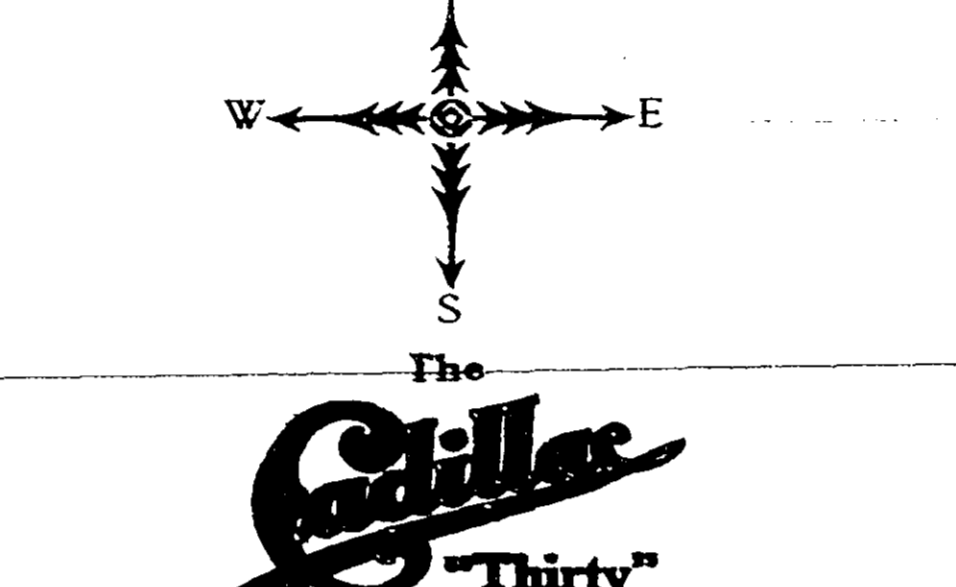
