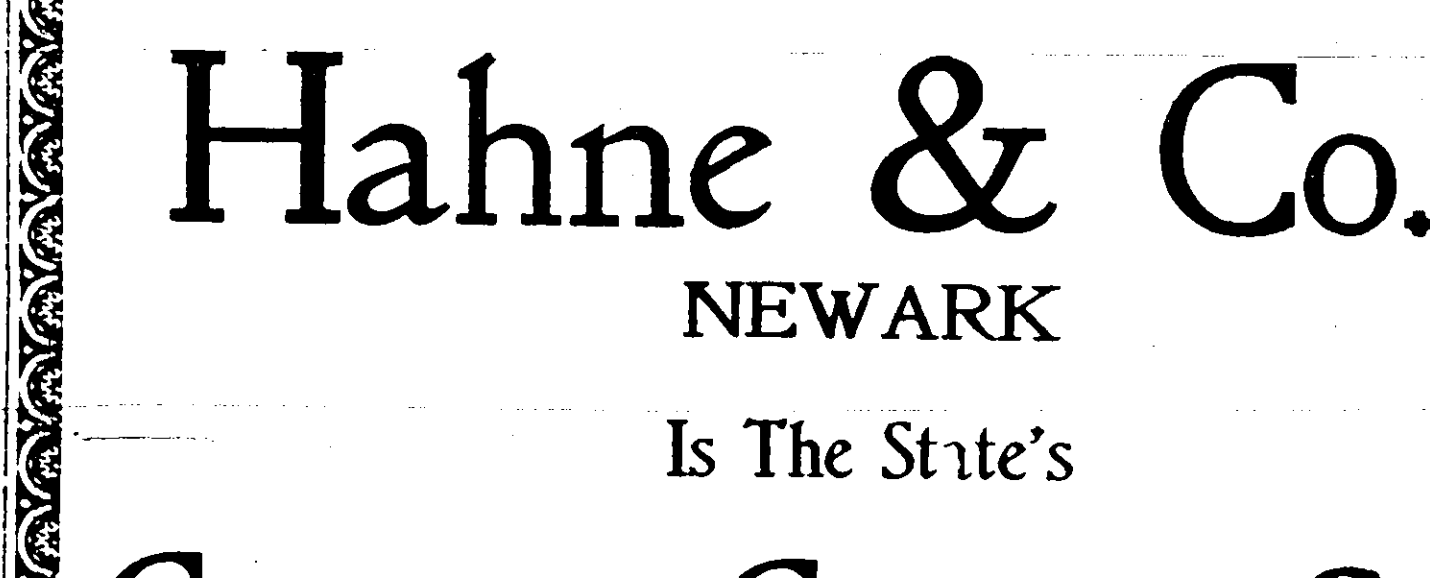

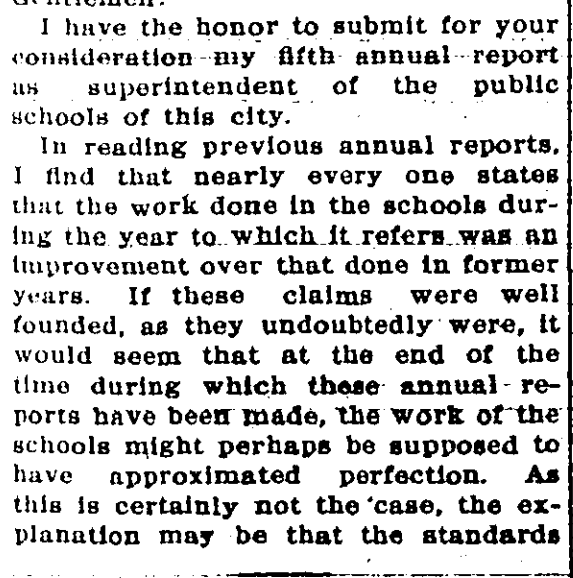
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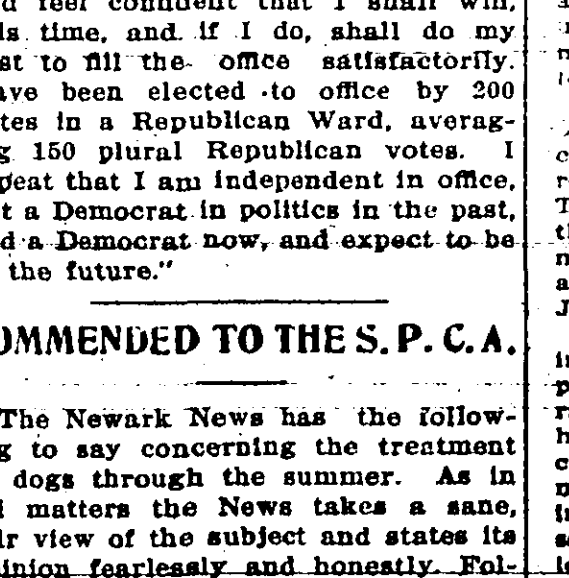
Blood Poisoning Follows Inoculation of Her Arm

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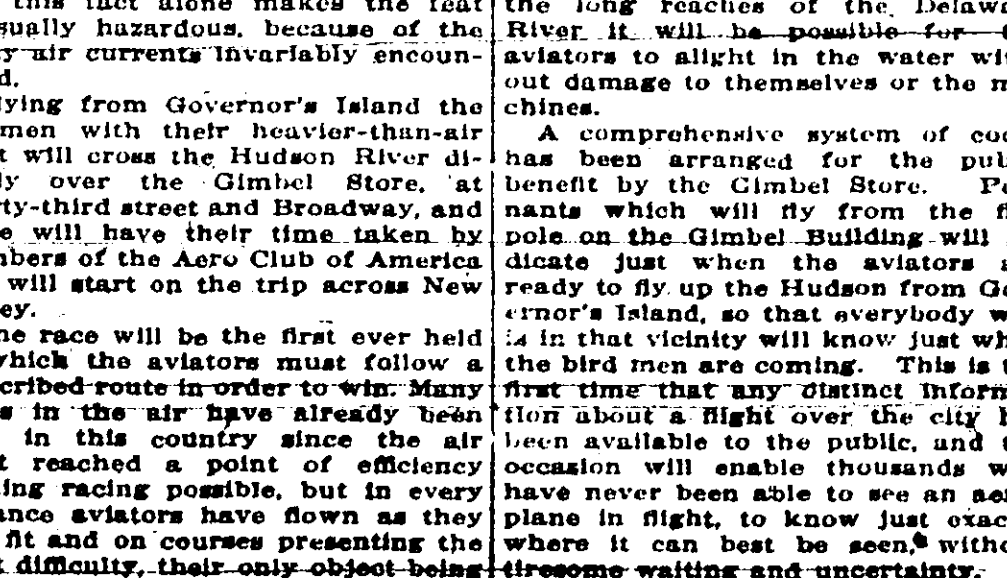

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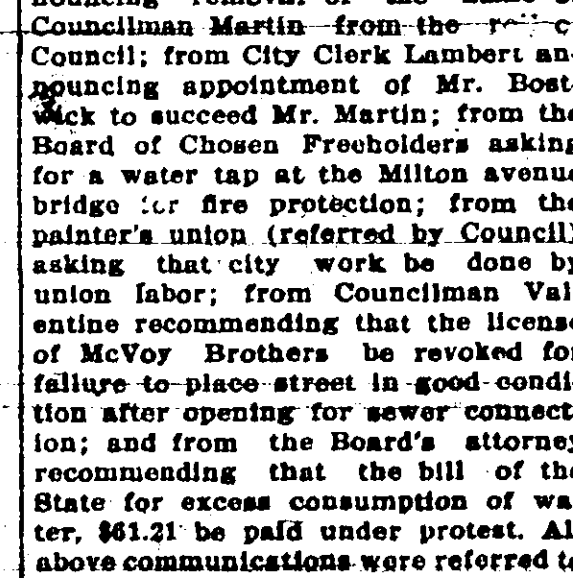
Hostwick's Credentials Laid Upon The Table

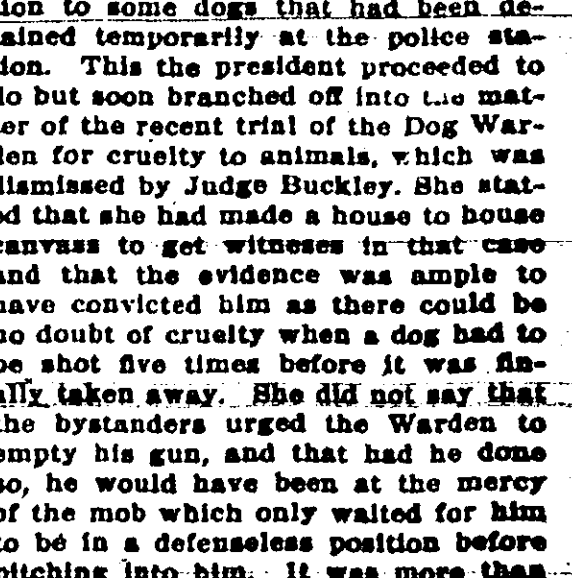

The deceased would have been twenty-two years old on August 2. He was a member of the senior class of the New York University Medical College and a graduate of the class of 1908 of Rahway High School. He was prominently associated with a number of social and athletic clubs.

His entire life was spent in Rahway. His father, Joseph A. Smith, Sr., was a prominent citizen and a member of the board of directors of the Rahway Water Board.

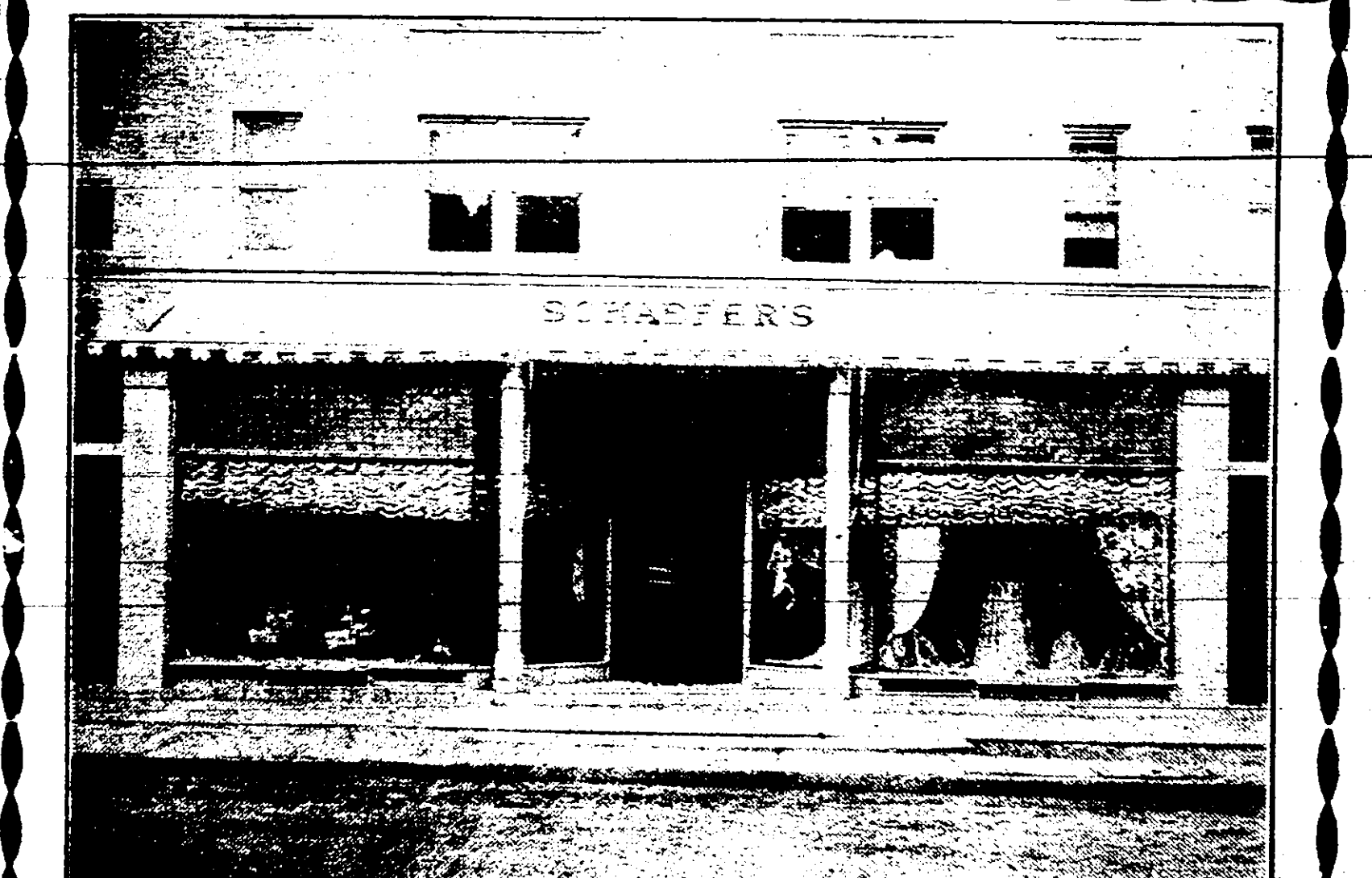

JUDGE KALISCH IN-SULTED BY COUNCIL

(Continued from Page One)
presented a letter embodying the suggestion of Judge Kalisch, of the Supreme Court in the matter of the vacation of the seat of Councilman of the Fourth Ward, as follows:
July 28, 1911.
Common Council of the City of Rahway, N. J.
Gentlemen:—
On the 15th of July, Mr. John A. Harshard as attorney for William S. Martin served me as attorney for the City with notice of application before the Supreme Court Justice Kalisch at Newark, for a writ of certiorari to review the action of the Common Council in dropping Mr. Martin's name from the roll. The matter was argued before Judge Kalisch this morning and decision was reserved.
In accordance with the opinion of Judge Kalisch, I advise you that the action of the Common Council taken on July 15th, dropping Mr. Martin's name from the roll was unauthorized and illegal, and I suggest that your action in this matter be reconsidered.
In the event of such reconsideration, I recommend that a committee of the Common Council be appointed for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not Mr. Martin resides in the Fourth Ward of the City of Rahway within the meaning of the Sixteenth section of our City Charter.

WASHINGTON LETTER

At last the President has accomplished the purpose of his special session of Congress, in that the Reciprocity law, and the country will await results as the wisdom of the vote in the Senate indicates the diversity of opinion as to the advisability of such a measure, and as it was initiated by a Republican President and supported by almost a solid Democratic vote, and could not have become a law without it, his act can hardly be claimed as a party measure. If it proves a benefit to the country, the President will receive his share of the praise, if it is disastrous, many contend it will be, he will be held accountable.
Over two million dollars worth of government bonds, issued during the Civil War, have been paid and turned into the Treasury for cancellation. These bonds have been stored in the Treasury, and when it was decided to mutilate them, the macerator, which would not do the work, owing to the unusual thickness and quality of the paper used. It is not removed but may remain, and to pay for the latter course should the Secretary recommend a reprimand. It is thought however, that some method will be devised by which he will remain in office.

The orchestra which has been selected from among the best professional players of New York City will number sixty men, and the solo parts will be taken by Marie Soudart, soprano; Rosalie Wirthlin, contralto; George Carre, tenor; and Frederic Martin, basso, and the entire production will be under the direction of Tall Esen Merges.
On account of this performance, the Pennsylvania Railroad will run a special train leaving Jersey City at 1:30 in the afternoon, stopping at Newark and Elizabeth, and returning after the performance, stopping at Red Bank, Rahway, Elizabeth and Newark.
