The bill is so framed as to be a particular boon to the poor, for the greatest reductions are made on cottons used by the middle classes and the poor. This feature of the Democratic bill is in particularly striking contrast to the Payne-Aldrich law, which levies the lowest rates on the grades of cottons used by the wealthy and the highest tax on the colons used by the poor.

The Payne-Aldrich tax of 50.02 per cent. on ready made clothing and articles of wearing apparel of every description composed of cotton or vegetable fibre is reduced 30 per cent. The Payne-Aldrich tax of 45 per cent. on blankets and quilts, towels, doilies, batting, mops, washrags, etc., is reduced to 25 per cent. The Payne-Aldrich tax of 50.02 on sheets is cut to 25 per cent. The Payne-Aldrich duty on shirts, sweaters and all articles of cotton underwear of every description is reduced to 30 per cent. Similar reductions are made on every item in the entire cotton schedule.

The cotton bill reported by the Democratic Ways and Means committee is especially designed to benefit the women and children of the country, there being a reduction of more than 45 per cent on nearly every item in the cotton bill used by them.
