A DIGEST of chapter 221 of the laws of 1911, relating to, regulating and providing for the government of cities, approved April 25, 1911, and generally known as the Commission Government Bill, as it affects the city of Rahway.

Under this Act, the City of Rahway can adopt an entirely new system of government. Procedure Necessary. Twenty per cent of the legal voters, voting at the last general election must sign a petition or request for a special election to adopt the provisions of this Act. It is necessary in Rahway to have the petition signed by at least 440 legal voters who voted at the election held in November, 1910. This petition is then filed with the City Clerk. The City Clerk must thereupon call an election, to be held on the third Tuesday following the date of filing, at which election ballots are printed, marked "For the Adoption" and "Against the Adoption" of the Act. In order to secure the adoption of the Act in this city it is necessary that a majority of the votes cast at this special election be in favor of the proposition, and it is also necessary that there shall be cast 650 votes in favor of the Act.

IS PAID DEPARTMENT ADVISABLE?

Irvington, New Jersey Has Solved The Problem. UP-TO-DATE CITIES HAVE ABOLISHED VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENTS. Important Feature of Modern Civic Advancement Missing in Rahway. A representative of the News-Herald called upon City Clerk Madison Stockman of Irvington, last week and obtained information in detail regarding the organization and present status of its paid fire department. Among the reasons which were the most serious interest to the people of Rahway is the fact that the abolishment of the Volunteer department took place in 1907 when the city had a population of about 9,500. It has grown rapidly and is now estimated to have increased to nearly 18,000. Originally there were the Chief at a salary of \$400 and two assistants at \$180 each with 45 call men at \$120 per year each. The latter have been reduced to 25 in number and the paid force consists of nine men including the chief. At the time the change was made there was the same character of opposition that has developed in Rahway, but Irvington was governed by a body of men who knew what was best for the city and they went ahead and performed their duty fearlessly, much to the satisfaction of the citizens and taxpayers who have never expressed the least regret because of the change. In passing an ordinance covering the operation of a paid department the council of Irvington was very careful to specify that no subscription papers should be circulated by or in behalf of the firemen and they thus removed one of the greatest nuisances with which all cities are afflicted when they are dominated by a volunteer association. In Irvington the "call men" must answer a call of all calls in the city and in addition to this they are paid for their services. The paid department has not only apparatus and because men are on duty all hours for immediate action they have had no fire of any serious nature since its organization. The insurance rates have been reduced and everyone recognizes the change to a paid department as one of the greatest of progress. It is said that Rahway is one of the few cities in the State which have retained the old method which favors the days of the hand pump. COMMISSION GOVERNMENT LEAGUE.
