The Solution Lies Largely In The Individual.  To the Editor of the News-Iterald'.  Occasionally, in those days of enlightened civilization, the people of the United States are aroused to a considerable degree by reports of some exceptionably brutal vengeance which an individual has suffered at the hands of a mob. The cause of the outbreak of primeval savagory is generally an assault upon women and the victim of the mob is generally a negro. The better nature of man seems to be lost in the overpowering rise of the beastly and brutal. The animal instinct seems to brush all before it and sweep into forgetfulness the humanity of man. The appearance of the offending negro, with his color akin to that of the savage, seems to call forth feelings of fury and hatred and to brush away as insignificant the lingering power of the law.  In Purcell, Oklahoma, on Thursday	cried for quick and speedy justice but it was the justice of the mob, the vengeance that demands a tooth for a tooth and a life for a lift. It was the justice of the wild beast who finds his mate lying dead and her slayer asleep in the neighboring shadows. It was a justice that makes a jest of legislation and a mockery of man's humanity to man. It was a pretext under which the animal instinct rose to its moment of supremacy, showing that it still rules in the life of man.  And what is the remedy? It is not the law. This is merely external and touches only the physical man. It is not the prison—Its walls are powerless and but manifest the uselessness of force. It is not the army. 


