A DIGEST of chapter 221 of the laws of 1911, relating to, and providing for the government of cities, approved April 25, 1911, and generally known as the Commission Government Bill, as it affects the city of Rahway.

Under this Act, the City of Rahway can adopt an entirely new system of government.
Procedure Necessary.
Twenty per cent of the legal voters voting at the last general election must sign a petition or request for a special election to adopt the provisions of this Act.
It is necessary in Rahway to have the petition signed by at least 400 legal voters who voted at the election held in November, 1910.
This petition is then filed with the City Clerk.
The City Clerk must thereupon call an election, to be held on the third Tuesday following the date of filing, at which election ballots are provided marked "For the Adoption" and "Against the Adoption" of the Act.
In order to secure the adoption of the Act in this city it is necessary that a majority of the votes cast at this special election be in favor of the proposition, and it is also necessary that there shall be cast about 600 votes in favor of the Act.
If the Act is Adopted.
Then the primary election is held on the fourth Tuesday following the adoption of the Act.
In this city, any 25 voters voting at the last election can nominate a candidate for Commissioner by filing a certificate with the City Clerk at least ten days previous to the primary election.
The list of candidates is then published, and at the primary a ballot with all these candidates' names, arranged in alphabetical order is furnished, and each voter at the primary votes for three candidates.
Election.
The election is then held four weeks after the holding of the primary.
The six candidates receiving the highest number of votes at the primary are the only ones who are voted for at the election.
A ballot is arranged with all their names in alphabetical order, and each voter votes for three and three receiving the greatest number of votes become Commissioners who are elected and hold office until the third Tuesday in May in the fourth year following their election.
NOTE - In every fourth year a primary is held on the second Tuesday in April, and the election is held on the second Tuesday in May.
Term of Office.
The Commissioners elected take office on the first Tuesday following their election, at noon, and when they take office the terms of all councilmen and aldermen and all other officers, whether elected or appointed, in the city, immediately cease and terminate, with the exception of policemen and firemen, who are protected by the Tenure of Office Act.
Vacancies.
Vacancies caused by any reason among the Commissioners, are filled by the remaining Commissioners within thirty days electing a properly qualified person for the unexpired term.
Duties of the Board.
All the administrative, judicial and legislative powers possessed by the Mayor and Council, and all other executive or legislative bodies are vested in the Board of Commissioners.
They are divided into three departments:
1. Department of Public Affairs and Public Safety.
2. Department of Streets, Public Improvements, Parks and Public Property.
3. Department of Finance.
The Commissioners determine the power and duties of each department.

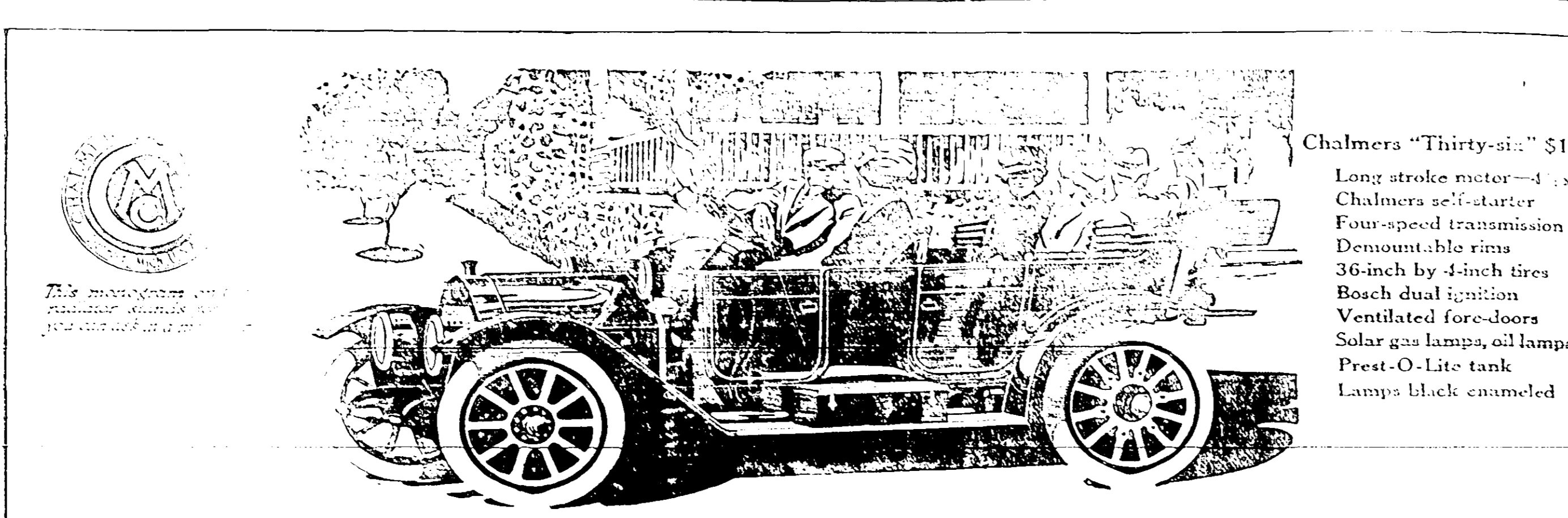

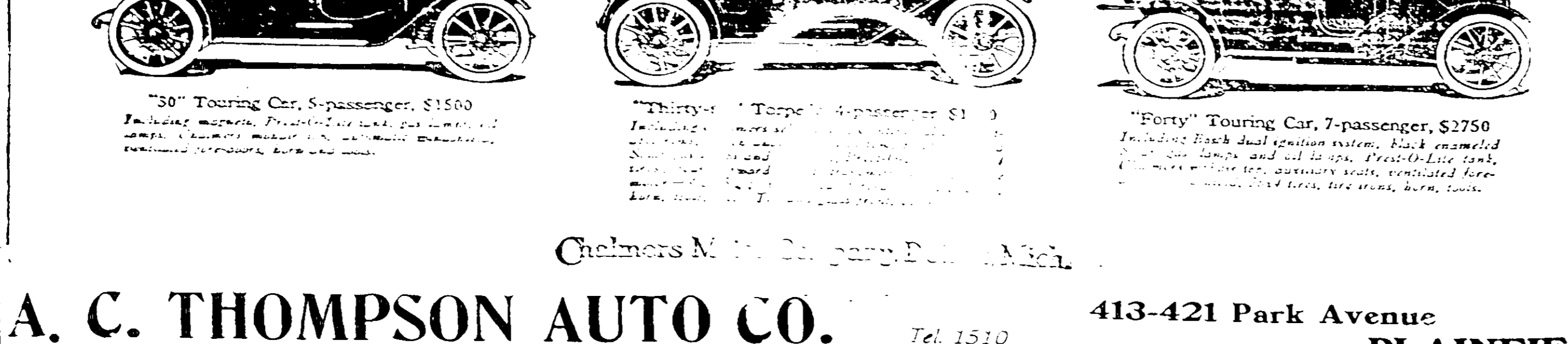
