The ordinance, under which the contract has been drawn, provides for assessment against the Main street property benefitted and any one who signs

a petition asking the Mayor to sign the contract knowns that the cost must be , so assessed and they know equally well that property owners will protest the assessments in court at immense expense to the city. Instead of the pavement costing the fancy figure of \$2.40 per square yard it will ultimately cost over \$3.00 including litigation.
