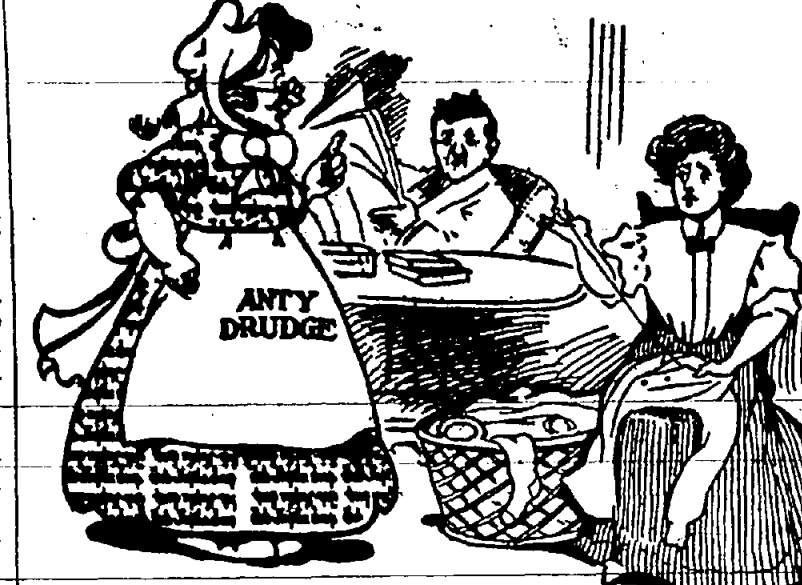

General John B. Woodland of the New Jersey district, acting under the immediate direction of Attorney General Wickham.

What the Government Seeks. After proceeding at great length to give the grounds on which it bases its numerous allegations of violations of the antitrust law by the steel corporation the petition concludes with the government prayer for assistance as follows:

That the petitioners be appointed receivers of the property of the defendants named, and that they be authorized to sell and dispose of the same, and that the proceeds of such sale be paid to the United States Treasury.

That the holding of stock by any one of the defendants in violation of the antitrust law be declared illegal, and that each of them be enjoined from continuing to hold or own such stock, and from exercising any right in connection therewith.

THE TRUST'S SIDE

The steel officials generally have maintained silence concerning the government's charges, but Judge Gary gave a statement denying every thing, he said, "if any harm results from it."

Mr. Morgan's position is that the steel trust has been of benefit to the country, and that the government's action would be a violation of the Sherman law.

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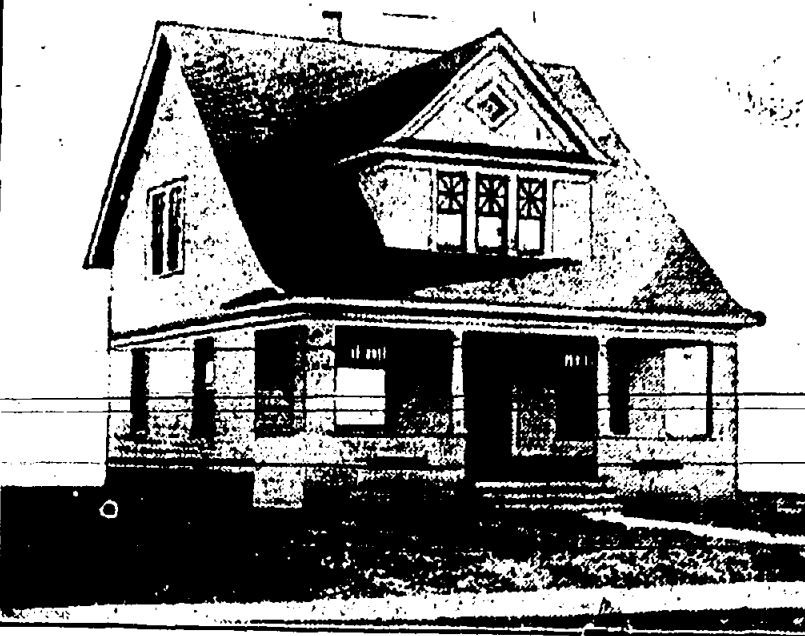
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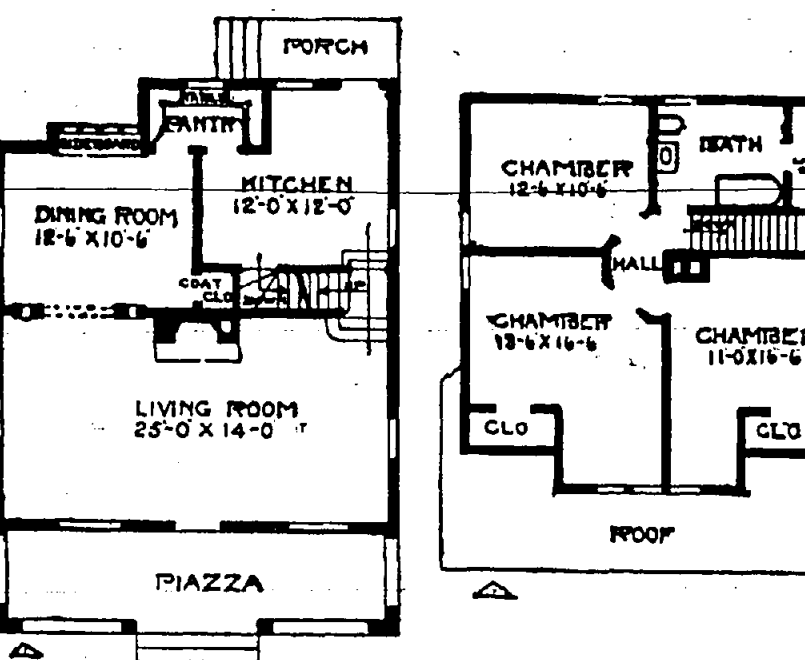
