Seven states provide for the commitment of habitual drunkards on the petition of relatives accompanied by proper medical certification. When a man has completely lost his selfcontrol and is a constant burden to his family, it should not be necessary for him to become so obnoxious to the community as to incur arrest for di orderly conduct before he can be conmitted to an institution. Medical authorities are unanimou in their belief in the farm colony treatment. The prime necessities are: Isolation from alcohol for a con-

tinuous period of time, abundance of light and fresh air, therapeutic baths and as much outdoor work as the pa tient is capable of physically. Not all cases of inebricty, however, can be treated alike. Physical differ ences due to the stage of the disease require classification and diversified treatment. Incipient and advancedcases cannot be treated together. The advantage of such colonies are that a large number of rounder would be taken from the streets courts, prisons, workhouses, and hospitals. Many cases that are a constarit menace to society would be re-

moved. Families that are burdened by earing for fathers and brothers who are habitually drunk would be relieved. But 'most important the individual would be isolated from alcoho and placed in a healthful environment and helped to lead a wholesome and partially self-supporting life. .....
