There are plenty of children in our sepools who have never been vaccinated, and there are multitudes-in-school-and-out-of-school who are carrying ugly scars on their arms and legs that have no more immunity in them than the scars in last year's apple trees. Let us vaccinate and revaccinate everybody or give un the practise, for an enlightened public will not stand for the injustice and the using of such a system much longer. The Health Board of Toledo, O., tried to enforce compulsory vaccination about a year ago, but signally failed. For Mayor Whitlock said:

I, for one, do not propose to be vaccinated. The school authorities may do as they please, but there will be no compulsory vaccination.' And this decision was taken when smallpox was raging in a neighboring city. "Nor is this all, for physicians who have had the courage to break with this century-long humbug, of which t e c are a great many, are telling us that many diseases are traced to L . . . 
