Make a straight band of mult three inches wide and of the required length and hem it all round with quartersinch hom. Sew to one edge bogh-oost tiods owt out girls aid to strips cut from the handkershief, turning the corners to the middle of the strip. Allow the lace edges to overlap at this point. Turn in all raw edges and hem down. Lay the remainder of the handkerchief in anali side platts, forming a jabot, and new to the lower edge of the neck band at the center. 

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
