





### ANOTHER INVESTIGATION

Government as having operated illegally, especially in its methods of fighting competitors. The salesmen had to educate the merchant to the use of the device now recognized as a necessity. Having created the machine and the market for it, it was but natural that the N C R should resort to all legitimate means to hold their trade. Their patents were infringed upon times without number and it might be within reason to say that they have spent millions in legal defense of their own inventions. They have had to meet fire with fire and if the misdeeds of their competitors were lumped together it is a safe wager they would more than overbalance anything of like character on the part of the N. C. R.

The published statement of Editor-Postmaster Rollinson is a lie and he should know it. His underling Heath did submit a motion which was seconded by Mr. Roarke that the Rollinson publications be made the official orwans of the Board of Trade.
