

BOARD OF EDUCATION INSPECTS NIGHT SCHOOL

At the meeting of the Board of Education, Tuesday evening, all members were present but Commissioners Hoffman, Ellis and Randolph. After the roll call the Board got right down to business and the secretary read a communication from the Janitors of the Public Schools of this city as follows:

Rahway, N. J., Dec. 19, 1911.

To the Honorable Board of Education:

We the undersigned Janitors of the Public Schools, do hereby petition your honorable body for an increase

of salary as living and rents are very high. It is impossible to have anything after you pay house rent, living, coal, clothes, etc. Hoping that you will grant the request, we remain, Yours most respectfully,

This communication was referred to the Building Committee. The secretary next read the pay roll which was passed upon by the Board. A transfer of \$1,400 from the Carteret tuition fee to the Night School was made.

Upon motion of Mr. Tucker the enrollment for the Night School was closed last evening on account of the large number of pupils that have al-

ready responded. It was estimated by Superintendent Bickett that 195 pupils have already enrolled and he stated that there were 185 pupils present Tuesday evening.

It was also suggested that accounts should be opened for the night school and was so ordered by the Board. Superintendent Bickett explained to the Board that he had not purchased any commercial books for the night school and that the cost of the books and the funds were very low. He estimated that it would cost the average of \$1.50 per pupil for the books. A motion was put before the Board and was carried that the books be ordered. Superintendent Bickett also reported that the lights in the Mechanical Drawing class should be lowered so as to enable the pupils to do better work as at present the lights are close to the ceiling.

As there were no other communications and no further business the

Board adjourned. Mr. Bickett stated that he would like to have a personal conference with the Board after they had inspected the different classes of the Night School and all members inspected every class and were well pleased with the attendance and the application of the students.

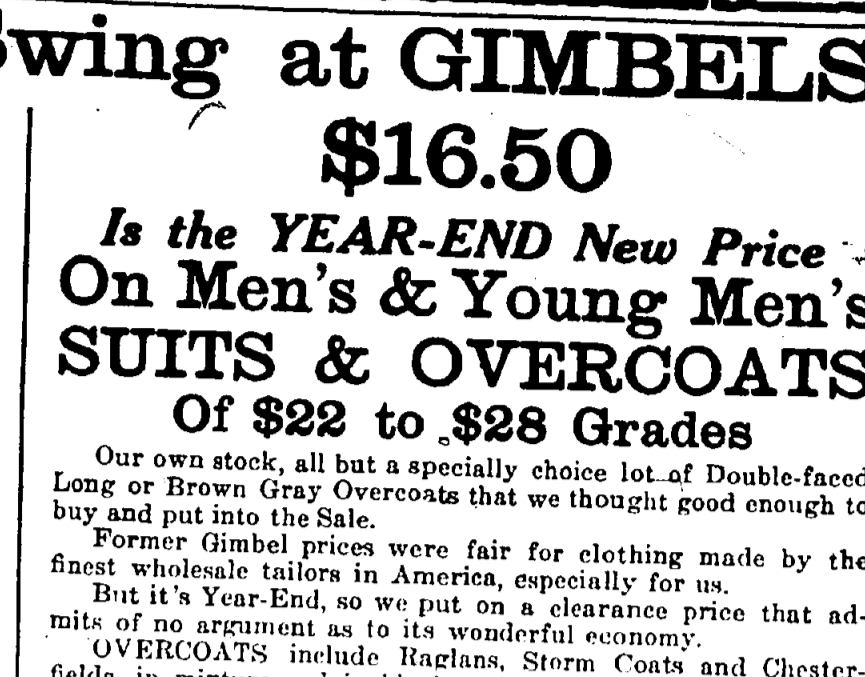

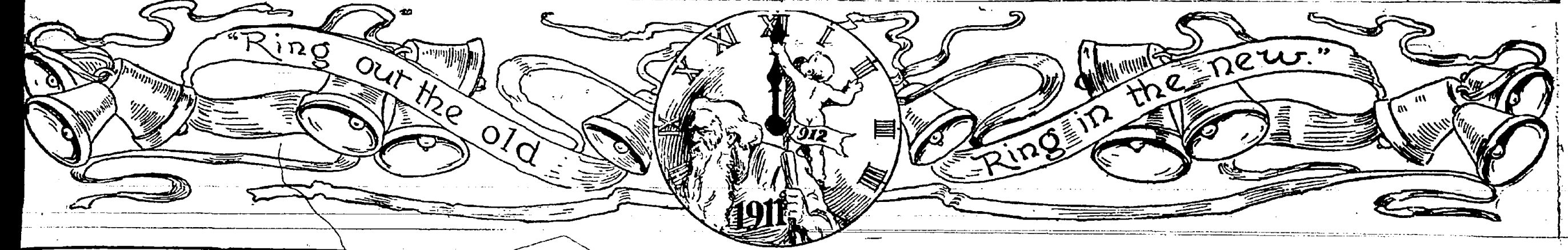
