CHILDREN'S SERVICE COMMITTEE A number of prominent women of the city have become deeply interested in The Children's Service Committee of the Family and Children's Society of Union County. The object of the Committee is to increase interest in the work of the Family and Children's Society throughout the County, to render efficient volunteer service, and to undertake the raising of funds. All money raised is contributed to the Family and Children's Society to support adequate work for children of Union County and to provide for the care of children who must be placed outside their own home in the foster homes of the Society. The Societyhas under its guardianship an average of 120 children

whose parents cannot care for them. It maintains a foster home service averaging 90. These are homes in all parts of the country. A foster-home is a private family who will receive the Society's wards into its small circle as a member until permanent plans can be made. Some children who can adjust to group care, are placed in neighboring schools and institutions. The children are brought to the Society because of sickness, death, neglect or cruelty of parents. A thorough investigation of the situation by competent case workers follows Plans for permanent care are made and carried out. After careful work it may be possible to return the child to his own parents' and to a rehabilitated home. Perhaps capable relatives: can be discovered. The child may be suitable for adoption. If permanent, long time care be required, he may be referred by petition to the court to the State Board of Children's Guardians. The Society is a private agency of 50 years standing, receiving no public funds, but supported;

by private contributions. The board of foster children cost \$33,659 in 1945, but parents of these children refunded \$20,606 of this sum.






