### TRAFFIC SAFETY CHECK CAMPAIGN

Announcement has been made by Chief of Police Clifford W. Dunphy that the local police force will participate in the Traffic Safety Check Campaign, through which it is hoped to eliminate accidents through a check of car equipment. The local police, together with other forces throughout the state, have been instructed to check horns, lights, windshield wipers, tires and brakes, advising motorists wherever necessary of adjustments which must be made. This of course is something that is covered under the Motor Vehicle Department of the State Examination program, but the State examination is on a periodic basis, and cars which pass inspection at the time of examination may not have all facilities operating a month later. The police checkup is another move to eliminate the accidents which are responsible in the country for more deaths than those killed in such wars as World Wars 1 and 2. Some persons are going to object to this so-called "interference," but in view of the type and condition of the cars which are on the road today and which will be called upon to go many more miles this summer than they have gone in years, the need for such continual inspection and check-up is apparent. Many war veterans are back, who have not driven for some years, while those at home who confined their driving to local streets will find themselves back on the high-speed highways where you must think fast and the equipment you are using must respond fast to the action of the driver.

The change in the motor vehicle picture is only apparent when you consider the reports covering automobile driving all over the State and nation. Some figures are startling. A thirteen percent increase in New Jersey drivers license revocations during the first three months of the year was reported this week by Motor Vehicle Commissioner Arthur W. McGee. The total revocations by magistrates and the Motor Vehicle Department was 2,314 as compared with 2,054 in the first three months of last year. Outstanding this year was the increase in revocations for drunken driving, there having been a total of 220 revocations as against 149 for last year. The increase was 57 percent. An increase was also noted in the number of habitual violators who lost their driving privileges. There were 188 of these—drivers with more than two convictions of traffic law who failed to heed the warning letter that was sent by the department after their second conviction. President Charles H. Stewart of the New Jersey Automobile Club in a statement this week declared "In recent months traffic fatalities have been running from 40 to 50 per cent higher than in corresponding months of last year. Total 1945 traffic deaths were 28,550 while injuries were close to a million. Unless there is prompt reversal of the current trend, there is every danger that the toll for this year will be close to the appalling total of 40,000 lives lost in traffic during 1941 when street and highway accidents reached an all-time peak."

The above figures are startling and indicate that not only must the car owner be sure that the equipment of his machine is in full operating order, but must take into consideration the burden, which falls upon the driver whether it be himself, a member of his family or someone else he permits to drive his machine. It would be wise to limit the driving of high school boys or girls, or people of tender age. It would be wise to skip the driving when tired, suffering from eye strain or in any way under the influence of liquor. Motor vehicle travel is due for a big step-up during next year and no one can afford to get into the full swing of ordinary or highway travel without all equipment, whether mechanical or mental, in good running order.

## Your Garden This Week

You can transplant shrubs and hardy perennials in May if you use certain precautions.

One is to cut back the tops of the woody material.

The larger the plants the more you have to cut them back. Remember, you have taken off a lot of roots in digging and the closer to the plant is too great. The reduced root system cannot support the whole top if it will naturally wither and dry up.

But if you remember to cut back and trim the stems of water to settle the soil around the roots, and then keep well watered until new roots have formed, you can successfully move the plants at any time of the year and especially in May.

The same rules apply more or less to perennials, especially if you move large clumps. It is pretty hard to move them in May, particularly the early blooming ones, and expect bloom this year. The reason is that if you leave in the top to bloom you will have too much drain on the roots which are left. It is better to cut them back rather than hard.

The late blooming perennials such as phlox, asters, sunflowers and many others that bloom in July, August or September can be moved quite satisfactorily and even if cut back will make enough growth to bloom this fall. In fact, most perennials and particularly hardy chrysanthemums do much better if they are dug up, separated and transplanted each spring for they make too large growth and get too thick to do well.

Even chrysanthemums and asters are divided up to one shoot and phlox to six or seven shoots will generally make better show in the late summer than the old clump left in place. The main thing is to cut back rather severely to remove a portion of the leafy growth. Water well to bring the soil up close contact with the roots and do not plant much deeper than the root growth somewhat.

The plenty of water in transplanting after the plant is well set, to settle the earth close to the roots. Also there is some advantage in shading for a few days, particularly the large plants. This will stop the drain from the leaves on the roots for water and give the plant a much better chance to get started.

With these simple precautions you should be able to transplant almost any plant at any time during May with success. Briefly then, the three principles are: 1. Cut back rather severely to remove a portion of the leafy growth. 2. Water well to bring the soil up close contact with the roots and do not plant much deeper than the root growth somewhat.
