Sunday Baseball in Rahway

Following years of controversy in this city over the playing of games at Riverside Park on Sunday, the Board of Education last week approved the use of the park, located in the very heart of the city, for baseball games each Sunday starting on June 30th. The action on this issue followed the holding of the park for night baseball games to a semi-professional team each Saturday night. The original action immediately developed into the use of the park nearly every night with even softball games getting in under the electric lights installed for the Saturday games. All of this represents a definite change in policy here and one which may be far-reaching. Every discussion of the development of Riverside Park for the use of sports, the erection of a stadium, etc., has found a deep-rooted conviction by many officials that the park was not properly located and could not be used for all sports at all times and therefore should be slowly but surely abandoned. The only games played there for five years have been the football games, never more than five in number of Rahway High each fall. The High School baseball team has not played at the park, even during the season just closed. The gates were locked and the condition of the park grounds carefully guarded. The action of the past few years along these lines may have been wiser for the Board of Education had spent considerable money on raising the level of the playing field by eighteen inches and had also surfaced and sodded the entire gridiron. Unfortunately the section reaching over to the old baseball diamond was left to level down to the river. As a result after the diamond had been reconstructed the early part of the month for the night games, heavy rains brought the river level up over the dirt part of the field, but left the raised football field section dry. Riverside Park represents an investment to the City of Rahway and is both an asset and an expense to the Board of Education.

The location of the field is entirely satisfactory from the standpoint of being readily accessible to all, but the lack of parking facilities is a serious matter. Money spent in straightening the river to avoid high flood waters during heavy rains would help keep floods from effecting the condition of the field. The noise of playing and the fans at night and on Sunday will be to some extent a nuisance to citizens living in the immediate neighborhood. However, the majority of the homes were built after the park had been established as a recreation center and therefore the owners could know what to expect. The action of the Board of Education in first granting a new team permission to play night ball on a field which had been denied the high school baseball team, followed by the complete reversal of opinion in permitting Sunday baseball, is unusual and to some extent startling. The majority of comment about the city, however, is not in criticism of the action taken last week, but the raising of the question as to why such action which can now be accepted as logical, had to be delayed for over ten years. It does little good, perhaps to discuss the delay of the past, but it does make good sense that what is satisfactory today should have been satisfactory before. The petition against the use of the park which was filed several years ago, was signed by many property owners in the vicinity of the park and a few who did not live very close to the field. The petition however only represented those people who opposed the measure on the basis of the nuisance angle. Some complaint will be registered now, although the fact action of the board in approving the move before discussion arose, may tend to shut off the usual objections. The citizens residing around the park and also throughout the entire city would like to know who the Board of Education refused so long to permit Sunday games at the park and now readily opens the gates for not only Sunday ball but also Saturday night games and the use of the park by even softball teams, which up to now have played on any playfield where a home plate could be dropped in the place of a stone.

Gold Stars in High School
The issuance of the annual year book of the Rahway High School, known as the "Allegorooter", of course pictures the various graduates from the school who received their diplomas on June 12th, a total of 188 altogether. This year printed the names of the graduates in the year book. Both the year book and the News-Record, however, had to make records complete by two notices of "In Memoriam" to list the names of two boys who did not graduate because they died during the war period. On a past week-end this month a plaque was dedicated at the high school with a long list of names of Rahway High graduates who paid the supreme sacrifice in the war. The studies of a number of Rahway boys were interrupted for the war under a definite program of Selective Service. Never before did anything like this be experienced here or in any other high school in America. The educational program which under state laws has been gradually developed to practically guarantee each child a high school education, is going to be interfered with in the future as it has been during the past five years. Graduated of high school, also will find their quest of further education to a great extent dependant upon the selective service laws which may be passed this year and in 1947. This may result in an entirely different program of education in both high schools and colleges.

Your Garden This Week

It's between seasons in the garden now. Spring bloom is over and you are getting ready for fall and winter bloom among ornamentals. And so it's a good time to check up and see how you're doing.

You must do a regular job of spraying to keep foliage healthy, particularly in the case of roses and some of the perennials. This is especially true in the case of roses which are now in full bloom. The reason for this is that the warm weather is coming on, plant diseases multiply, particularly mildew and black-spot of roses. The remedy for mildew is to spray with sulfur, although Bordeaux can be substituted on herbaceous perennials with good results.

To kill broad-weed in the lawn, spray with 2-4-D but be sure to use it according to directions. Growth of some grasses may be slowed with this material, but most of them will come back again. If you have many broad-leaved weeds in the lawn and you take them out by spraying now, you will leave bare spaces for crab grass to get started. Don't cut your grass too short. Let it build up a good root system to go through the summer. Rather than cutting an inch and a half to two inches is the best way to maintain a thick sod so that crab grass does not get a start. Crab grass needs a lot of sunbath on the your seedlings to keep them growing.

You can still plant gaudious in 10-day or two-week intervals until the first of July and get a good crop. The first half of June is the time that most people plant dahlias. They do well planted then, although the writer prefers earlier. To be sure, if they are planted so early they need more attention, cutting back and watering when needed. Dahlias planted now probably will make a good September bloom as any other time you can plant, but you will need a moderate amount of pinching.

Kill Victory Garden Bugs
The adults of the Mexican beetle are now feeding and laying eggs. A timely dust of rotenone will destroy many of them. The eggs, in yellow clusters on the underside of the leaves may be rubbed off, start dusting with rotenone at weekly intervals. This prevents destruction of leaves. No leaves, no beans.
