Open Registration Democratic Way

The Board of Education voted, 5 to 4, at last month's meeting to reject a proposed plan to transfer the sixth grades of Grover Cleveland, Washington and Columbus schools to Franklin, Roosevelt and Madison schools. The plan was advanced as a means to decrease the imbalance which exists in the city's public schools where three schools have large percentages of Negro pupils.

There certainly will be other plans proposed in the future to end the alleged de facto segregation in the public schools. No plan could hope to win unanimous approval from the residents of the city. An effort should be made to find the solution for imbalance which would be fairest to all concerned.

The plan to transfer the sixth grades was a poor one since it would have transferred a large number of pupils out of their neighborhood schools and forced them to attend other schools far from their homes. While a few sincere individuals undoubtedly supported the plan, the majority of those backing the idea sought only to increase the financial burden upon the school system and to cause confusion.

It seems to us that the only completely fair and impartial plan would be to have open registration for all pupils.

The registration would be conducted at all elementary schools of the city on a specified day. The parents would register their children at the schools of their choice. The selection of the pupils for the schools would be made on a first-come, first-served basis.

We can see nothing wrong with the plan. The only objection could be that parents will be forced to take the time to go to the schools to register their children.

Adoption of such a plan would end all charges of imbalance, inferior education, cultural discrimination and poverty facilities.

The plan is completely democratic since it gives all parents an equal chance of the best of the city's schools. In addition, "first-come, first-served" would be the basis of selection.

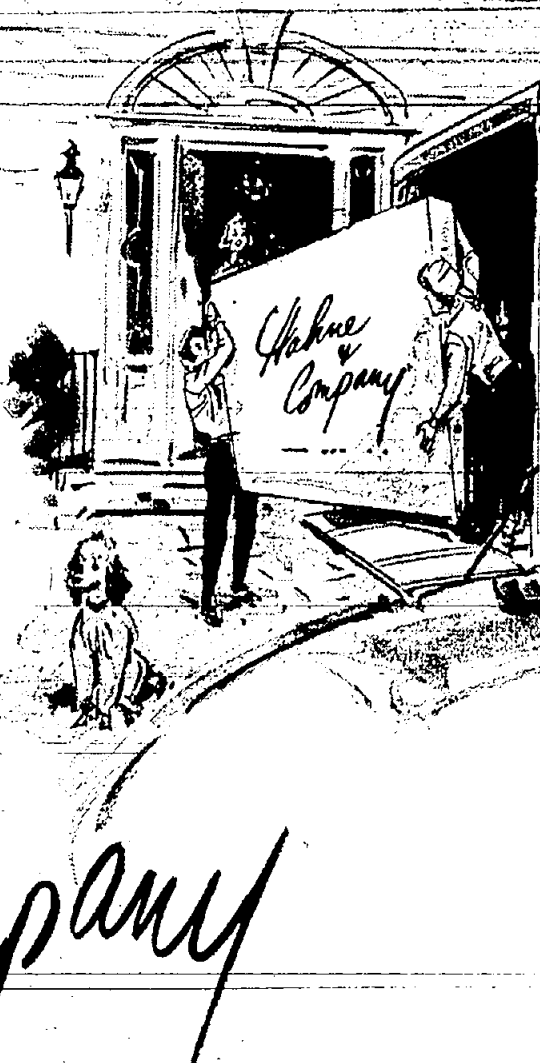
