Firemen Offering Award Presented Extra Protection

The Rahway Fire Department is asking the help of residents of the city in bringing up to date a list of persons requiring special care in the event of an emergency. This list is part of a program begun in 1959 to facilitate the location and rescue disabled persons who would not be able to leave their homes in time of an emergency without

A brilliant, reflector-type window seal, similar to that shown above, will be delivered to any resident registering with this program. The seal should be placed on the front door or window of the residence in which the confined person-lives. A small seal also will be provided for the particular room in which the person will likely be

Upon receipt of an alarm, the dispatcher will check a desk file and advise responding apparatus by radio of the probable location of a person withthe involved structure. Should multiple alarms be received or communications interrupted for any reason, the seals also will indicate to rescue Personnel that special precautions must be taken.
