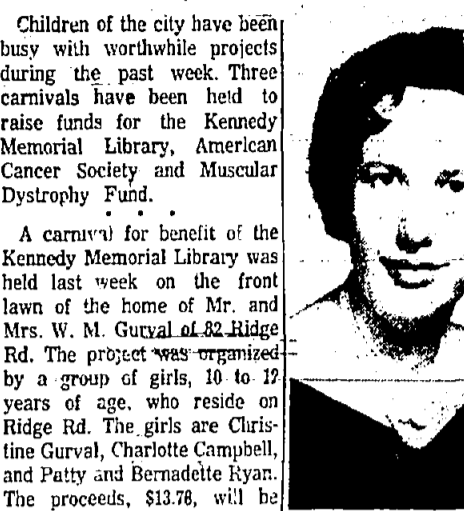

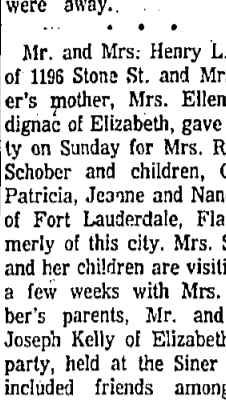

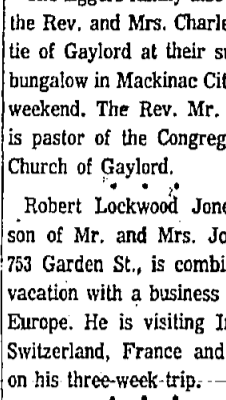
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2,758 Children Were Registered Here For Summer Playground Program

The Little Theater group, which began last year, increased in size. Fifty-eight children had an active part in this year's program.

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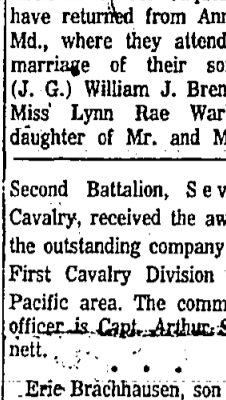

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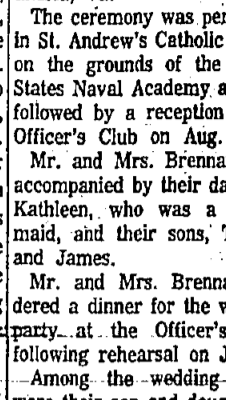
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Official Says Tax Forms Due Sept. 1

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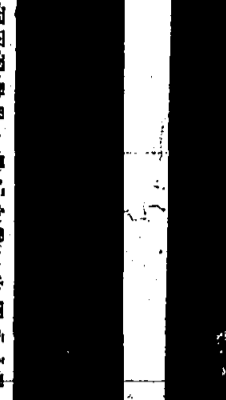
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Retired Men's Club Gives Toys to County Hospital

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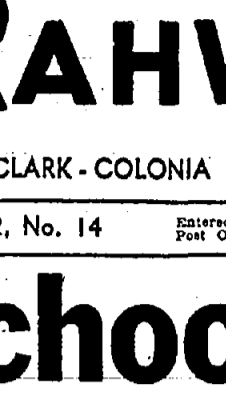

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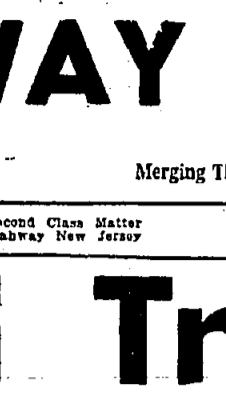
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Plans to Open Schools On Sept. 9 Announced

The hours for the elementary schools will be from 8:45 a.m. to 2:45 p.m., which will provide a full day schedule also for the afternoon schools.

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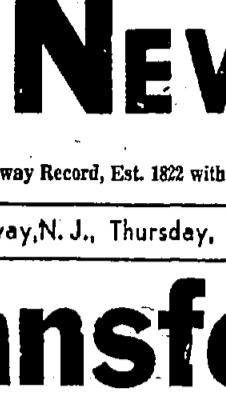
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Nash to Assume Duties as Head Of Curriculum

Mr. Nash has been devoting most of his time to his duties as secretary to the board. He was given \$600 for extra services this year by the board.

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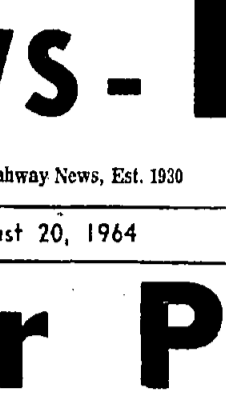
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Lincoln School Tract May Be Library Site

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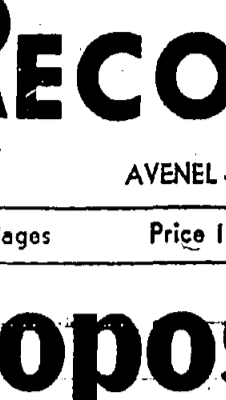
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Day Camp's Season Ends Tomorrow; Trip Planned

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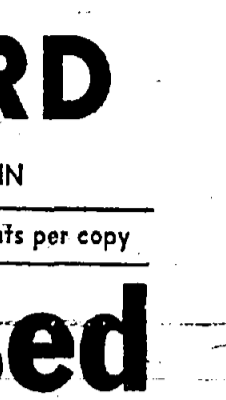

Eye position should be at least 14 inches above the work surface. Books and other reading matter should be propped up about 30 degrees toward the eyes. The study lamps should provide at least 150-watts of light.

Timely Rains Helped New Jersey's Crops "Timely rains during July brought relief from the two-month drought that had plagued New Jersey farmers and have improved prospects for many crops, according to the August report of the New Jersey Crop Reporting Service, issued this week.

The report points out, however, that many irrigation facilities are still in use and prolonged reliance on irrigation to keep crops thriving has resulted in a substantial increase in production costs. The welcome rainfall renewed growth of forage crops, pastures, field corn and soybeans, and added size to both apples and peaches. W. Dickson Cunningham of this city was the coach of the United States senior tennis team which captured the Gordon Trophy over the weekend when it completed a sweep of eight matches against a Canadian team. This was the 10th time in 17 matches that the United States won. The matches were held at Lake Placid, N. Y., for players 45 years of age and over.

Thomas Homgard, Rahway's gift to the pro-baseball world, lifted his pitching record above the 300 mark, by scoring two wins last week for his Tri-City, Wash., team in the Northwest League. The local speed-baller has a season record of 19-4. He struck out 16 men in the two games and has a season record of 101 in 123 innings.

Jack Jordan, ace pitcher of the Intra-County League leaders, the Betsytown V.F.W. team, will report for duty this week.

On Saturday night, Sept. 12, the Denver Broncos will invade Shyne Stadium to meet the New York Jets in the opening game of the American Football League season.

Playing his third season for the Broncos will be a former Rahway High School great, Bob Scarpitto. Many fans will be in the crowd of more than 35,000 expected for the game.

Bob Bowie, sports reporter for the Denver Post, sends the Rahway News-Record the following information:

"From the Broncos training camp at Fort Collins, Colo., Sept. 12, 1954, the following information was received:

"Scarpitto really can run those out, go and comeback patterns, Denver Broncos' defensive back Tom Janik noted aloud. "You can't hear him stop." Cornerback Willie Brown nodded agreement.

"They were watching flanker Bobby Scarpitto run his pass patterns during a recent workout. 'Scarpitto,' as he is known to Jack McCorinnick and Don Braux.

"Sometimes you can hear the receivers coming, clomp, clomp, clomp," Janik explained. "You can tell when they stop, but Scarpitto, you don't hear him at all."

"Did you see that Spee, who will explode in the art of pass catching at the drop of a football, had plenty to say about his little prize who at 5-11, 194 pounds, is the second smallest player on the squad.

"He's the opposite type of receiver from Lionel Taylor, the main reason being physically. We consider him a quick receiver because his movements are sharp and precise in contrast to Lionel's fluid and weaving style.

"He's got the quick feet and that makes him a threat on the long pass and an excellent third down receiver on quick, short, sharp breaks to the sidelines.

"His lack of height is a detriment," Spee continued, "so he practices taking the ball high to cope with tall defensive backs. He's developing extremely well with this maneuver."

"Scarpitto, who came to the Broncos from San Diego in a trade prior to the 1952 season, disagreed. 'My size is no handicap,' he said. 'A flanker is open more coming out into a pass pattern. It isn't crowded.'

"I work on my cutting, to help make up the difference in size and I break off my cuts sharp to get the step on the defender," he explained.

"He's extremely dangerous after making a catch," Spee continued. "His good reactions help him get more yards and has helped his development up to a good receiver."

"As for the moment, Scarpitto is the Broncos' No. 1 flanker. Billy Graham has moved to split and behind Taylor as Scarpitto's competition is coming from rookies Al Denon of Florida A & M and Odell Barry of Findlay College.

"Now in his fourth year of pro football, the 25-year old Denver flanker is 'fully recovered' from the fractured shoulder which he sustained in the Broncos' final game of the 1953 American Football League season. The mild-tempered-in Denver when Oakland's Fred Williamson tackled him after Scarpitto caught a pass.

"Up until then he caught 21 passes, scored five touchdowns and dropped only five throws. According to Spee's figures, 10 of the 59 passes aimed at Scarpitto were 'bad throws' the fault of the passer.

"His style reminds me a lot of Boston's Jim Colough and of Ray Renfro, who played with the Cleveland Browns when I was there," Spee said. "Bob's faster than Colough — and very much underrated."

"In fact, he's one of the fastest flankers in the league. Alworth (Lance) doesn't count because he's inhuman — he's an antelope," Spee laughed.

"Coach Sidney Gillman of the Chargers traded Scarpitto to the Broncos with no qualms, because he had the Arkansas speedster ready to take over the spot Bob played in 1951. This year he hopes to accomplish two ambitions on the football field.

"I'd like to finish among the top 10 receivers with 45 to 50 catches and I think I can do it. If they'll throw the ball to me," he said. "And I'd like to see the Broncos win a few more games. I think we can do that too." Will travel to Buffalo on Sunday, Sept. 20, for their last game in the East. The Broncos will be seen in Channel 7 on Oct. 11 when the Kansas City goes to the "Mile High City" and again on Nov. 15 when the Jets play their return game in Denver.
