United Fund Distributes \$55,200 To Agencies; Awards Citations

The United Fund of Rahway has approved distribution of \$55,200 raised so far in the 1965-66 campaign and has awarded citations for outstanding achievement to many firms and their employees and to volunteers in the drive.

Action was taken at the annual meeting on Thursday night in City Hall with E. V. Zuckerman, retiring president, presiding. He was succeeded by Anthony Y. Caruso.

Samuel M. Robinson, general campaign chairman who re-

ceived a plaque for his work, emphasized to the large crowd of agency representatives and others that the biggest stumbling block in the drive was the lack of sufficient workers.

"The figure of \$78,000 was not a fictitious goal," Mr. Robinson declared. "With 500 workers instead of last fall's 221 we could raise that much money for our eight member agencies."

Mr. Zuckerman asserted that industry has been accepting its share of the burden and said

that residents must be willing to accept theirs.

Allocations by agencies will be as follows: Red Cross, \$9,460; Boy Scouts, \$6,050; Cerebral Palsy, \$1,760; Mental Health, \$2,475; Girl Scouts, \$5,325; Y.M.C.A., \$15,510; Retarded Children, \$3,775; and Youth and Family Counseling Service, \$1,760.

The sum of \$1,375 was set aside for unpaid pledges and \$5,710 for fund administration and campaign expenses.

Fund leaders expressed the hope that an additional \$3,000 still may be raised. The extra amount will be apportioned among the agencies. The \$55,200 now allocated is \$22,300 less than the \$78,000 goal set last spring by the budget committee.

Distinguished service awards were conferred on employees and management of the following plants, which also received community service citations: Merck & Co. Announce Dates Of Home Show

The third annual Home Show will be held on April 29 and 30 and May 1 in the building at 1305 Fulton St. It was announced yesterday by the Redevelopment Agency. The property formerly was occupied by the Rahway Lumber Co.

Jules J. Small Sr., conservation agent of the agency, will be general chairman for the event.

Mr. Small said yesterday that plans being made for the Home Show include exhibits in the booths by local merchants and possibly by distributors of products. There also will be exhibits prepared by the city's churches and schools, Mr.

Small stated. Door prizes are to be awarded.

Nearly 2,000 persons attended last April's show in the Cross Keys Hotel. Music was provided by the city's schools and the Twirlers and Adult Art Class of the Recreation Department provided demonstrations. A twirling competition was conducted.

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Township Library Listed for Grant

CLARK — Tentative approval of a \$48,500 state grant toward construction of the \$194,000 Clark Library building has been received by township officials from the State Department of Education.

Mayor William J. Maguire has scheduled a meeting for Monday night to consider the necessary requirements for obtaining final approval.

State Commissioner of Education Frederick M. Raubiner notified Mayor Maguire that final approval of the grant is contingent upon Clark's submission of evidence that local matching funds are available for completion of the proposed structure. This evidence must be submitted to the education department by May 1. Failure to comply will result in automatic disqualification of the grant application.

The mayor and the Municipal Council will meet on Monday with Edward S. Ayers, president of the library trustees, and Charles E. Driessen, chairman of the board's site committee, to outline requirements for immediate action by Council. In August, 1964, the Council passed a resolution stating that the library parking facilities and equipment would cost \$194,000 and that if the grant was approved the remaining \$145,500 would be raised by the issuance of bonds.

The present library at 1071 Raritan Rd. was established by the Friends of the Library Services of Clark. They were responsible for the referendum in May, 1950, approving the library and have contributed over \$20,000 in books. The library now contains more than 11,000 volumes and is in constant use by township adults and children.

City Attorney Patten Lauded for Service

Irish Luck Holds In Search Abroad

The luck of the Irish was with us recently when we were asked to trace the significance of the "Red Hand" which appears on the O'Neill family crest.

With "Lamh Dearg Aba" (The Red Hand Forever) as our motto, we assigned our Irish correspondent to the story. She searched through the heraldry books in the Rahway Library and discovered that the bloody hand is the predominant symbol in the flag of Ulster — but no information about the O'Neill legend. Her auld sod researched to the Irish consulate in New York — where the brogues were thick but the explanation was not to be found.

Still undaunted, she located an Irish export firm in Dublin and promptly dispatched a request for Gaelic assistance: A helpful Irishman, Patrick B. Doyle, of the Dublin firm, graciously transcribed passages from ancient bard for us.

Mr. Doyle explained that the "Red Hand of the O'Neills"

signifies the courage and strength of the family line. He confirmed as traditional the story that a nobleman, father (Continued on Page 8)

School Budget Being Studied By Councilmen

CLARK — Municipal Council has until Saturday to consider the Board of Education's 1965-66 school budget. No date has been set by the Council for a public meeting to adopt a resolution for the budget appropriation. Council President Thomas P. Winters stated yesterday.

The Council has been meeting with the Board of Education to consider the appropriations now requested in the \$1,148,621 budget submitted to the voters on Feb. 23. The budget had been cut by \$25,000 after its first defeat.

Municipal Council, which will meet tonight at 7 o'clock to consider the twice-defeated 1965-66 school budget, will hold a public hearing on the city budget at 8 p.m. on Wednesday.

The special meeting of Council tonight will follow two sessions at which the proposed budget of the Board of Education was considered. The budget was sent to Council after voters rejected it at the Feb. 9 and 23 elections. Council must take action on the budget by Tuesday or it will go to the state commissioner of education for action.

Council met with the Board of Education and school administrators on Tuesday night in Roosevelt School auditorium. Questions asked by councilmen were answered. The proposed school budget was the topic of the Council at a caucus last night.

Council must decide whether the proposed school budget is to be approved as submitted, increased or decreased. The budget figures referred to the governing body by the board are: Current expenses, \$2,819,550.75; capital outlay, \$71,858, and debt service, \$207,725. The suggested tax levy includes the following: Current expenses, \$2,332,833.75; capital outlay, \$46,608, and debt service, \$178,325.

The Board of Education has insisted that the 1965-66 budget appropriations would provide only the absolute minimum necessary for operation of the city's public schools.

The proposed 1965 municipal budget totals \$2,252,581.33, as compared with \$2,956,197.22 last year. The amount appropriated for municipal purposes totals \$2,842,644.85 this year as compared with last year's \$2,560,226.22.

Check on Vision Urged by Doctor

Great-grandfather may have proudly claimed his eyesight was as good as the age of 80 as 20, but a local vision care specialist says great-grandfather's feat was more legendary than fact.

Disregarding the changes in visual abilities brought on by the very process of aging, which of itself required proper care of sight, the stresses and requirements placed on the use of our eyes in "space age" living demand maximum visual performance, warns Dr. Gerald J. Zinberg of Rahway, speaking in connection with the 38th annual observance of National Save Your Vision Week, March 7-13.

Dr. Zinberg said, "good vision contributes to success and enjoyment of almost every endeavor of every man, woman and child today—the job, in the home, in the classroom, driving a car, playing golf—and yet more than 50 million Americans are unaware of their being hampered in these activities by visual defects.

"Vision can change so gradually that problems related to the ability to see properly are unknowingly jeopardizing millions of Americans in large and small ways.

Expressing the very vital need of every individual to conserve and protect his vision in terms of national warning signs, Dr. Zinberg, cites the following: At least one out of every four children of school age has some kind of eye trouble today. Most of the visual screening surveys throughout the country indicate that 20 to 40 per cent of the students need vision care for their academic studies.

One out of every high school and college athlete has poor vision-enough to affect his play, according to recent study. Eye defects and diseases ranked as fourth major cause for the disqualification of young men being examined for induction into the armed forces during the five-year period.

Four out of every 10 employees were found to have vision inadequate for their jobs in a survey of employees of 50 companies. Of all those with faulty vision, few had any idea or knowledge of their visual defects which were resulting in poor efficiency, loss of production, and higher accident rates.

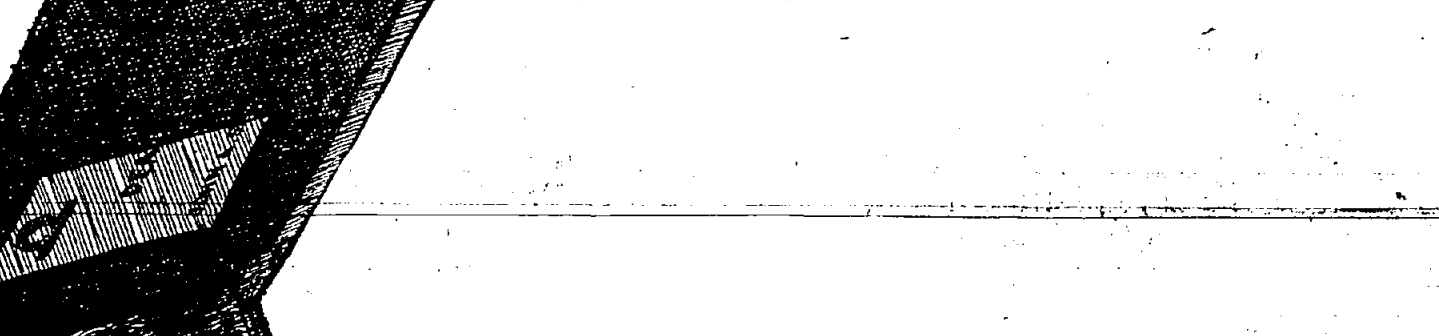

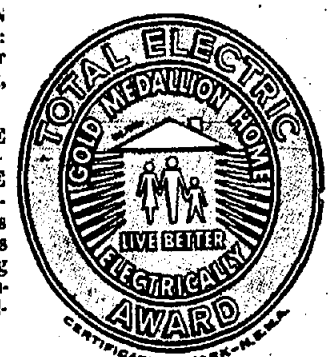
