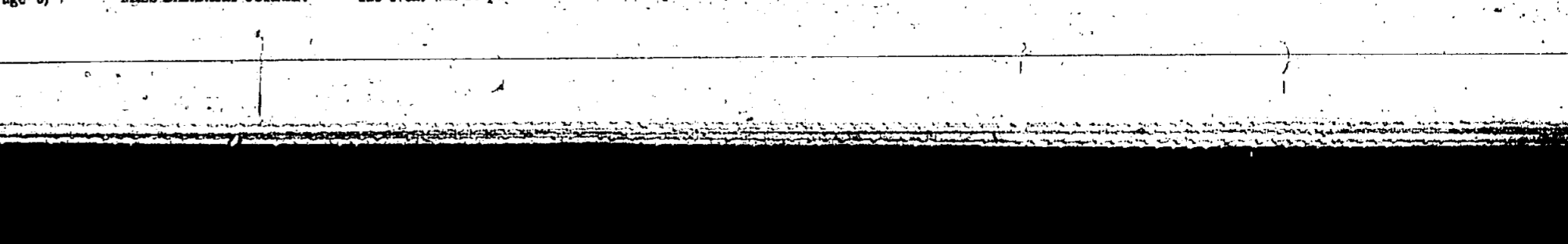
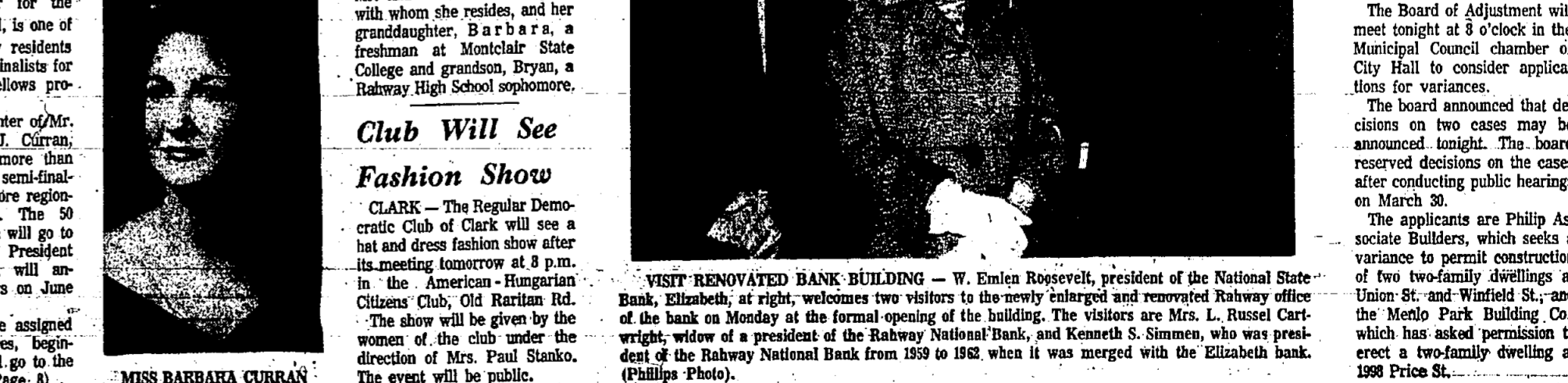
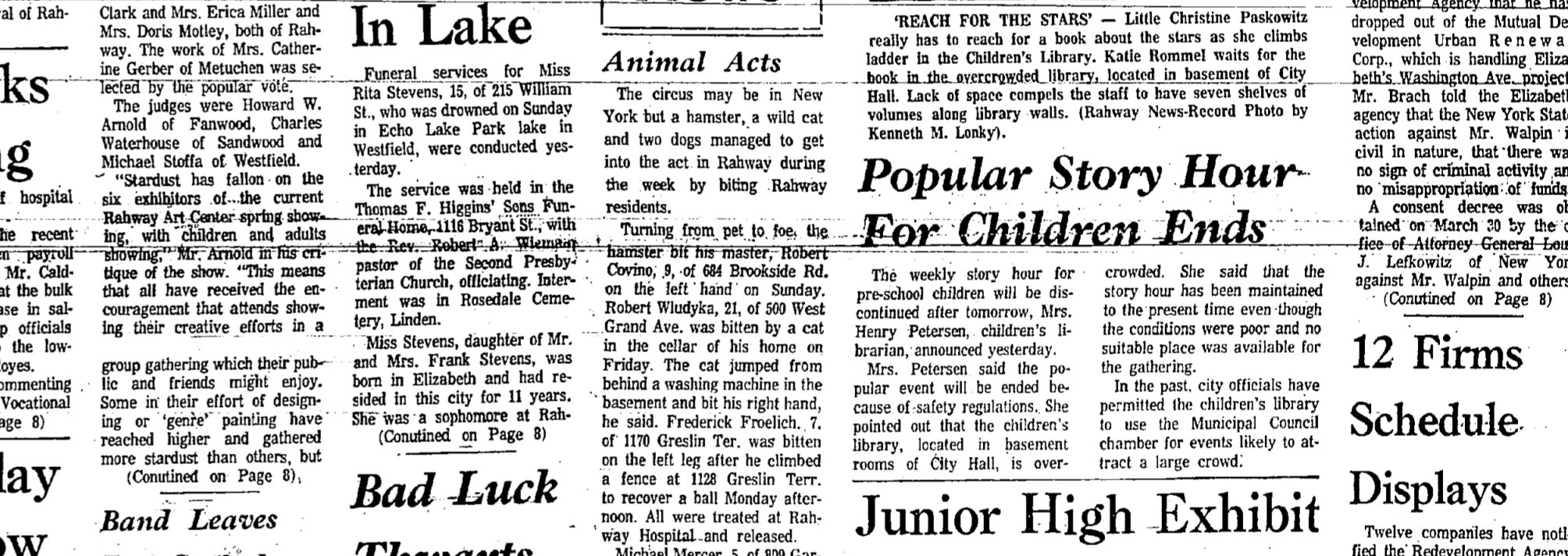

Trout Season's Opening Sat.

On Saturday at 8 a.m. thousands of fishermen will line the bank of the Rahway River for the opening of the 1965 trout season.

Stocking crews from the Charles O. Hayford, State Fish Hatchery in Hackettstown have placed 1,540 brook trout adults, 70 adult brown trout and 5,300 rainbow trout adults in the river.

Ash Brook in Clark Township has received 150 brook trout adults and 40 brown trout adults, including seven to nine-inch trout.

Trout season will run through Feb. 23, 1966, and striped bass from March 1 through Dec. 31. A license is required of all persons 14 years of age or older, except farmers fishing on their own land and servicemen who are residents of this state. A non-resident who is on active duty with any branch of the armed services shall be entitled to fish after having obtained a resident's fishing license. They may be secured from Amorelli's Sports Shop on Elm Ave., daily from 8:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Resident license fee is \$4.15 and non-residents and aliens' license fee is \$7.15. In addition, \$2 resident and \$5 non-resident trout stamps must be obtained. No fishing license is required of persons under 14. Non-resident three-day vacation license is \$3.65.

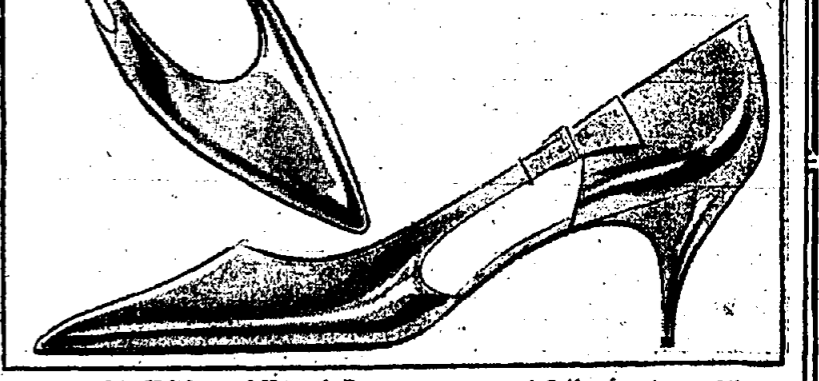
