

21 Apartments Are Proposed For 'A' Zone

An application by the Stan Michael Corp., South Orange, for a variance to construct a 21-unit apartment building at St. George Ave. and Ross St. will be given a public hearing by the Board of Adjustment on Monday at 8 p.m. in City Hall.

The variance is required because the proposed site is in an "A" residential zone. The property is known as Lots 14, 15, 28 and 29 of Block 167.

The board also has scheduled two other cases for Monday night.

The first case will be that of the Lorene Industrial Corp. of this city which seeks a variance to permit construction of offices and warehouse on Lots 26 and 29 of Block 680, New Brunswick and East Lake Ave. The proposed site is in a "B" residential zone. The case is scheduled for 7:30 o'clock.

The second case, scheduled for 7:45 o'clock, concerns the application by Anthony Yanni of this city for a variance to allow him to erect a house at Price St. and Kearney Ave. The variance is required because construction would result in insufficient sideyard.

5. Paintings must be picked up by the owner at 5 p.m. on June 6. The Rahway Jayceettes will not be responsible for any paintings left in their care.

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Westfield, RHS Set To Play

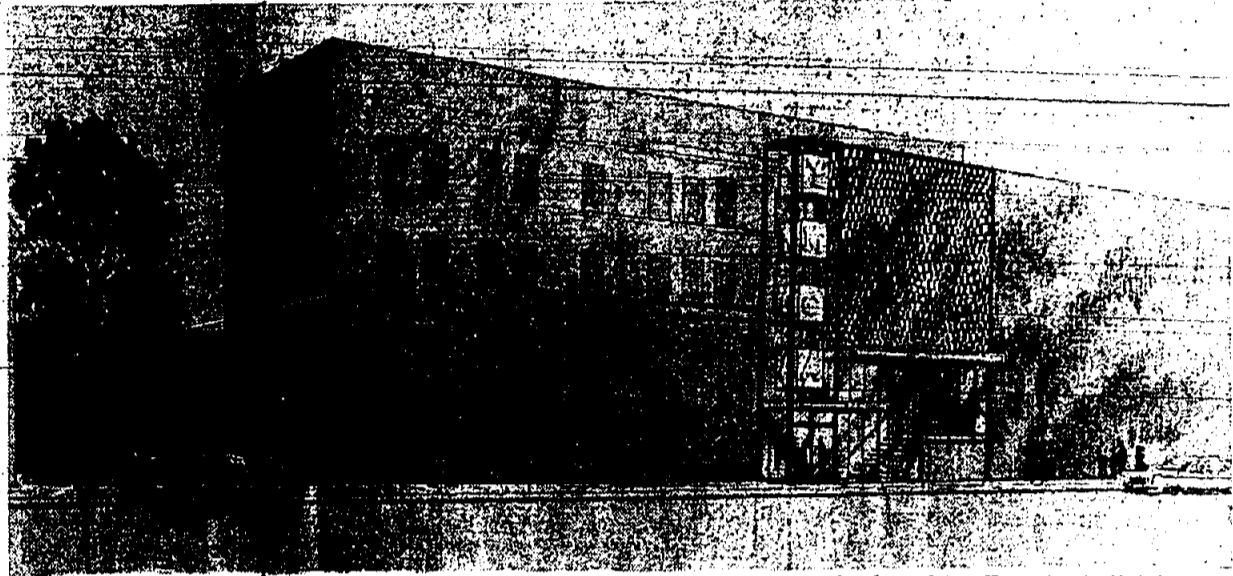

YMCA Commences Fund Drive To Raise \$450,000 for Addition; Plan New Gymnasium and Pool



PLANNED BY YMCA — The \$450,000 capital funds campaign, announced this week by the Rahway Young Men's Christian Association, will permit the construction of an addition, pictured at the right in the above rendering, to the present building at 1564 Irving St. The addition will house a new swimming pool, gymnasium, boiler-room, and shower and locker facilities for men and women. The present building was erected in 1917.

A \$450,000 capital funds campaign was announced yesterday for the Rahway Young Men's Christian Association as its first major building and modernization program in 50 years.

William H. Rand Jr. of this city, president of the Tingley Rubber Corp., was named general chairman for the campaign by Edward L. Rickes, president of the YMCA. Charles E. Reed, who served as president of the association for 20 years, was appointed honorary chairman.

Mr. Rickes, in announcing the official start of the campaign at a meeting of the YMCA board of directors, stated, "Today marks the culmination of three years of planning and preparation for this drive. Now that the campaign is underway, I hope that everyone will catch the spirit of this effort to provide the expanded services so vitally needed by the Rahway YMCA."

The \$450,000 campaign is the first phase of a long-range building and improvement program totaling \$750,000. The current drive, to be known as the Golden Anniversary Phase, will commemorate 50 years of service in 1967 from the present "Y" building. Funds will be used to provide such major units as a new 75 by 30-foot swimming pool; full-size gymnasium; boys' and men's shower facilities; boys' and men's locker facilities; girls' and women's shower facilities; girls' and women's locker facilities. Revolver, Dropped, Wounds Patrolman

Patrolman Walter J. Sauer Jr., 26, was shot when he "dropped" his gun and it accidentally discharged. Police Chief Lawrence E. Coman said today.

Despite widespread reports of a "mystery shooting," Police Chief Coman had spoken to members of the Police Department since the accident and had stated that he was wounded when he dropped his revolver while cleaning it. The policeman is still listed in critical condition in Rahway Hospital following the shooting shortly before 2:30 p.m. on Sunday.

Hospital officials stated that he is still in critical condition but is "somewhat better" than when he was admitted. They said that the bullet entered the patrolman's chest and nicked the top of his liver. If the bullet had entered a few inches lower and lodged in the liver, the wound probably would have been fatal, a hospital spokesman indicated.

In discussing the shooting, Chief Coman said that as a re-

sult of Sunday's accident a series of weekly "in-service training sessions" would be instituted for all department members "as soon as possible." He said that the men would be ordered to attend these training sessions for instruction in handling firearms.

3 Serious Crashes Injure 4 Persons

One driver is hospitalized and another is free on \$350 bail following three serious auto accidents in Rahway over the weekend.

Anthony Hildbrandt, 25, of 110 Ely St., Elizabeth, was reported yesterday to be in satisfactory condition in Rahway Hospital following an accident on Friday afternoon at St. George Ave. and Hamilton St. He was admitted to the hospital with a concussion, internal injuries and multiple lacerations and abrasions. He was traveling north on St. George Ave. but told police that he does not remember the crash.

The Hildbrandt auto crashed head-on into a car driven by George Cragin, 44, of 169 Brook Dr., Dover. Mr. Cragin reported to police that he was driving south on the avenue in the inside lane when the Hildbrandt car crossed lanes and crashed into his vehicle. Mr. Cragin stated

that he was driving about 30 mph. His head and right knee were injured, he said.

Two accidents were reported on Saturday.

In a three-car accident on St. George Ave., a car driven by Leonard Farber, 44, of 55 Edgewood Rd., Linden, was traveling north on the street and an auto driven by Mrs. Alida J. Moffitt, 19, of 741 Hemlock St. was stopped in the southbound lane.

Agency Provides Service to City

The annual report of the Youth and Family Counseling Service, one of the eight United Fund of Rahway agencies, shows that Rahway ranked third from the top in the number of families served in 1964.

Rahway's 26 families and 285 hours of counseling service put it in that position among the 28 communities in four counties who were aided.

During the year, the report shows, a total of 210 families involving 432 individuals were served throughout the agency's area, calling for 2,396 professional interviewing hours.

These services given by the agency to the entire area will be touched upon at the third annual guest meeting of the agency at 8:15 p.m. on Monday in Trinity Parish House, Forest and North Aves., Cranford.

Milton Faith, executive director, will speak on "Whose Problem Is the Adolescent Problem?" and Dr. Saul Piliuck, executive director of the Essexfields Group Rehabilitation Center, Newark, will discuss "A New Approach to the Treatment of Juvenile Delinquency."

The greatest single category of problem represented in applicants to the agency are marital difficulty, followed by parent-child relationships, adolescent and adult personality adjustment and educational and vocational adjustment.

Clients were referred to the agency by many sources of the 210 families handled last year, 53 were sent by health and social agencies, 43 by the clergy, 31 by schools and 13 by doctors.

Those seeking aid represent virtually all major religious affiliations. Last year 51 were Roman Catholic, 35 Presbyterian, 22 each, Episcopalian and Methodist, and 18 each, Baptist and Hebrew.

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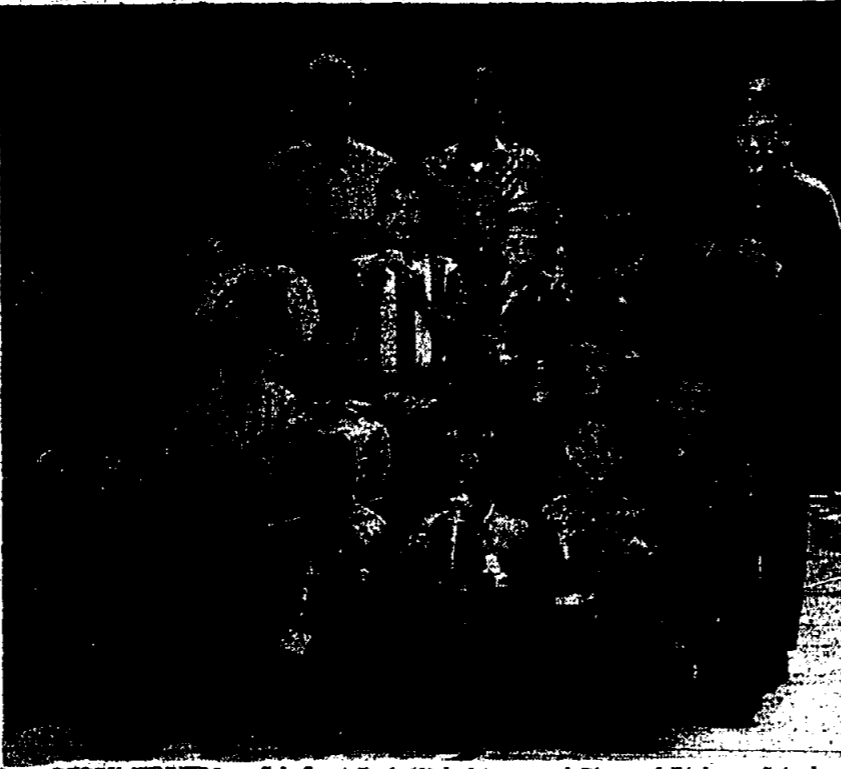

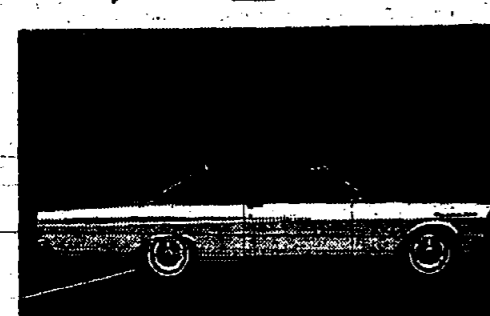
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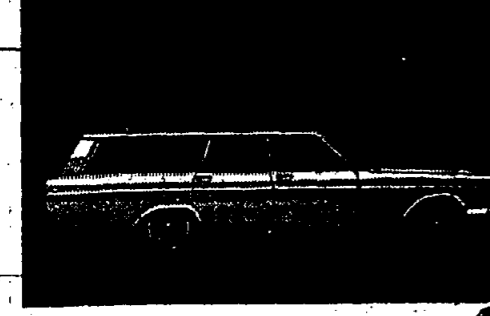
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Music Festival Attended by 450

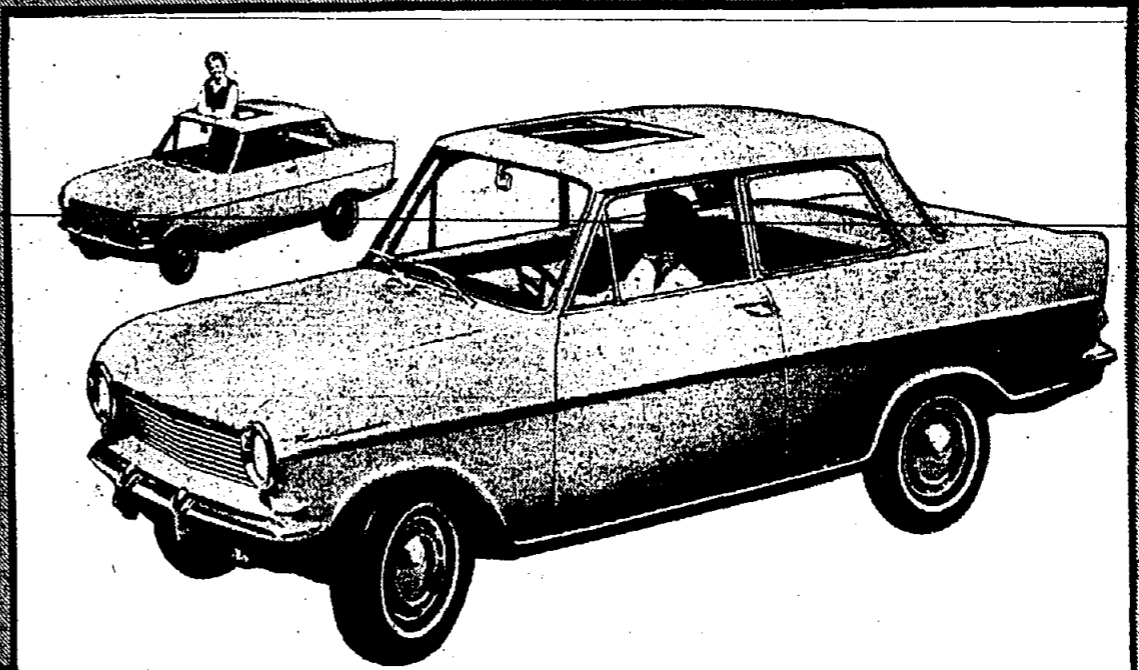
