REGIONAL MATH PROGRAM DESCRIBED

Joseph Scott, Coordinator of Mathematics in the Union County Regional High Schools is author of an article in the summer issue of the Research Bulletin of the New Jersey School Development, entitled "Meeting Needs of College-Bound Students with Weakness in Mathematics." It describes a program which is in effect in all of the high schools of the Regional District.

The program began in the district in 1951 after thorough study by the special work provided therein and the special methods used it has been instrumental in cutting beginning algebra failures by at least 15 percent. The three-year sequence, known as College Preparatory Mathematics I, II and III, gives the student the background to pursue normal college requirements.
