## EXECUTIVE BOARD SETS FINAL GOAL

The Executive Board of The United Fund of Rahway has voted unanimously to establish the 1965-67 goal at \$83,000, to support the work of eleven agencies.

Mrs. Mallory Hinman, President of the United Fund of Rahway and Very Reverend Monsignor Patrick J. 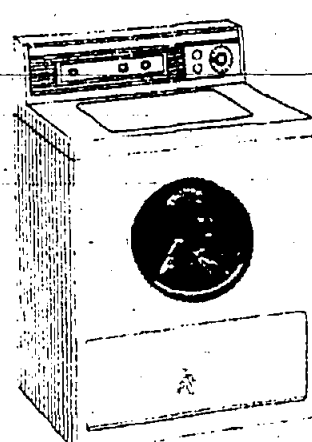
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
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# Ray's Corner

An important notice from the Y.M.C.A.'s in the Central Atlantic Area was sent out this week regarding the coming indoor swimming and diving season. The Y.M.C.A. has announced the following rule changes in the swimming and diving program which, effective immediately, prohibits all variety swimmers or divers who compete for a secondary school system from competing in the C.A.A. swimming and diving championships.

The rule change was introduced by the rules committee and presented to the C.A.A. Committee for ratification in May of this year. Inasmuch as the rule change limits participation, the committee was concerned as to the necessity of such a rule and just what purpose it would serve. Since the inception of the Y.M.C.A. ruling (which prohibits members from participating for another club during the high school season) the Y.M.C.A. has been concerned as to what purpose it was serving in letting boys swim in the C.A.A.'s who, during the season, cannot swim for the Y.M.C.A. Further, the Y.M.C.A. was concerned about boys who were competing all year for the Y.M.C.A. and then at the end of the season were not able to compete due to the variety high school swimming being brought in. The caller of the competition was just too late for these youngsters to compete. The problem seemed quite simple on the surface — drop the Y.M.C.A. from competing at the end of the season. This was presented to the problem, that of the "independent school system" which permits swimmers to compete all year round without restriction. In order to make the level of competition equal so that all can compete on the same basis, the Y.M.C.A. is forced into the present legislation. The Y.M.C.A. will now only serve those boys in the 15-17 age group who are not being served by a variety school team.

We agree with the Y.M.C.A.'s in this ruling, and hope that any day the Y.M.C.A.'s will draw up plans for the interest of the athletes and not themselves.
