



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

Will your son be able to get into the University of his choice? When your daughter's ready for college -- will there be classroom space for her? If your child wants to be a secretary --- or a salesman --- or a teacher --- is he or she receiving the proper preparation right now?

You'd better hape so. Because if-your children are students in the Rahway public schools -- there's some question about whether or not our schools can prepare them for the future. Education has evidently taken a back seat in Rahway --- so your children can hardly expect to take the driver's seat when they start applying to colleges or for employment. Not worried about the future? Then let's think just

about the present. The people of Rahway will go to the polls this Tues-

day, February 28, to vote again on the School Budget. Once again, the education of our children is on the line Last week, most of the children in Rahway classrooms, the Bandrey Marsh's proposal for a Senior Advisory Board. Has

were parentless' -- at the polls at least. The large majority of fathers and mothers in Rahway didn't have the time or the interest to get out and vote. They preferred to let other residents decide the outcome of the School Budget for them.

Some of the people of Rahway have apparently adopted a danaerously negative attitude; they are simply agains spending for our schools. Rather than positive interest and automations, they have experimented forces to defeat any ereaders. Does the metered parking in Rohway make mapping pays less money per student for education that most other Union County towns ---- and more money per person for Municipal Government than comparable Union County towns. Obviously the place to do our cutting is in City Hall --- not the classroom.

There has been some concern raised about the problem of senior citizens living on a fixed income. There's already been provision made for those residents over 65 to receive a senior citizen deduction on their taxes --perhaps this is the way to solve that problem. Let's work with our City officials to ease the tax burden for our elder citizens -- just as other communities have done. But let's not create more problems for our young people by depriving them of the essentials of their education.


