



Theft of Clock, Vandalism Result in Decision to Close

City's Post Office at 9 p.m. Sonicone has stolen time from the Rahway Post Office at Main Street and E. Milton Avenue.

And amateur wood carvers have been busy whittling the building's window sills. As a result of the vandalism, which has included the theft of a clock from the lobby and the defacement of the sills, the regional director of the Postal Service has decided to have the lobby of the Rahway Post Uffice closed between 9 p.m. and 5 a.m., starting Monday, March 8. The lobby has been open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, for the convenience

of the patrons. Postmaster Warren I. Moulton of Buhway, in announcing the decision to close the lobby at 9 p.m., stated that several women have complained to him that they have been fearful of being accosted by individuals and gangs lottering in the Jobby during the early evening and night hours. The postmaster said the lobby has been open all of the time since the new post office building was constructed several years ago. The selfservice Rostal unit and Post office box section are located in The Jobby -

"The vandalism and destruction that has resulted from leaving the lobby open throughout the night makes the closing necessary," Postmaster Moulton stated. Postmaster Moulton also said that letters comprising a sign over the self-service unit have been stolen, ball-point pens provided for the convenience of customers are taken as quickly as they are replaced and windows have been broken. The custodian staff has had to remove writing from the walls, he added. The Rahway police have been "most cooperative," Post-master Moulton stated. He pointed out, however, that it is not possible to have a patrolman or a Postal Service employee stationed in the lobby throughout the night. "It is a sad commentary on our times that post office customers must be denied this convenience because of the actions of these vandals and lotterers, Postmaster Moulton said.







It has also been asked during many public meetings: how much will the state get from the real property tax, and how much will be left for the operation of clark's municipal government? Again, you know the asker of that question knows very little since the state government doesn't get anything from the real projecty tax. What the state does get is a proportion of the business. ersonal property tax. That tax is levied, as it says, personal property (chattel) owned by businesses. In 1966 or 1967, the state took over the collection of that tax from the municipalities, and since, then, it has repated a portion of that tax to each maner ality based on the amount of chattel reported by industries and businesses in each municipality. In other words, not only will Clark get a substantial

ratable estimated at producing something like \$200,000 worth of taxes, but it will also benefit in that a portion of the receipts of the chattel tax will also be added to the township's tax coffers. March is the Month Taxpayers Should be Heard on Budgets

Public hearings for municipal budgets are coming up shortly, and their approaches should signal among the taxpayers of Rahway and Clark a wunt to get out principles, and it is therefore, a gradual, continuing and be heard. The Rahway public hearing for the municipal budget is planned-for-Wednesday, March 10, and the Clark budget will be aired Wednesday, March 17. In Rahway, the municipal budget composes about 150 points of a proposed tax increase of about 220 points. Everything is tentative at this point, so the paper thinks it would behoove Rahwayans to attend the hearing and propose ways of trimming municipal expenditures. A 220 - point increase is a horror, this aper wouldn't wish on any taxpayer. It means a 20 per cent increase in the tax rate, perhaps the largest increase in the city tax rate in memory. n Clark, the municipal budget makes up 33 of a 122 - point tax increase. Council there made an effort. to keep spending low, and perhaps more fat could be cut out of the budget.

Near the construction site of our Salem Nuclear Generating Station on the Delaware River, a team of biologists is carrying out an extensive marine tite survey. The study started in 1968 and will continue for several years after the station goes into operation. Fish are being caught daily, counted, identified and studied. Certain species of tish are tagged so their migration patterns can be learned. A small number undergo laboratory analysis. In addition, samples of vegetation and plankton from the river and nearby creeks are taken so that every form of marine life is included in this study. All this is being done by Public Service to help safeguard the ecology of the river and to provide scientific proof that marine life in the area of our Salem station will remain essentially unchanged.
