Delay in Primary Election Now Seems Less Likely

Chances that the primary election would be changed from June to September were reduced last week when Superior Court Judge Samuel Alcorn Jr. in Newark denied a request for an injunction barring implementation of the new State election law. Good Chance to Air a Problem

Rahway and Clark residents will have an excellent opportunity to voice their opinions about the flooding problem in the Rahway River basin on Tuesday, April 27, at 7:30 p. m. in Franklin School, Rahway.

The Army Corps of Engineers will have representatives present to listen to the history of flooding from the basin which has been affected by the Army Corps of Engineers also will hear complaints and suggestions for improvement of the conditions along the river.

Col. James W. Barnett, district engineer, has made an outline of questions which could be answered in preparation for the meeting.

The questions are:

1. What areas of communities require flood protection and what are the types of protection desired in each area?
2. When did recent floods occur and what were the depths of flooding at specific locations for each occurrence?
3. How severe were hazards to life and health?
4. What were the extent and types of damage caused by flooding, including the estimated value of losses to property, transportation, income, crops, ecology and the environment?
5. What is the value of real and associated valuations of lands, buildings and facilities directly affected and the anticipated increase in value thereof, if improvements were effected?
6. What related problems exist?
7. What corrective actions should be taken on recognized areas?

The Army Corps of Engineers is seeking information so it may prepare a plan to solve the flooding problems which have existed in Rahway and Clark for several years. Residents, especially those who have been affected by past floods, and organizations, such as Rahway and Clark Flood Control, should prepare for the April 27 meeting and document any statements prepared for the Army engineers.

The meeting will provide Rahway and Clark with an excellent opportunity to present the full picture of what the river basin flooding belts the Army Corps of Engineers. That opportunity should not be missed.

MUSICAL EXPERIMENT

The Potted Plants Refuse to Dance!

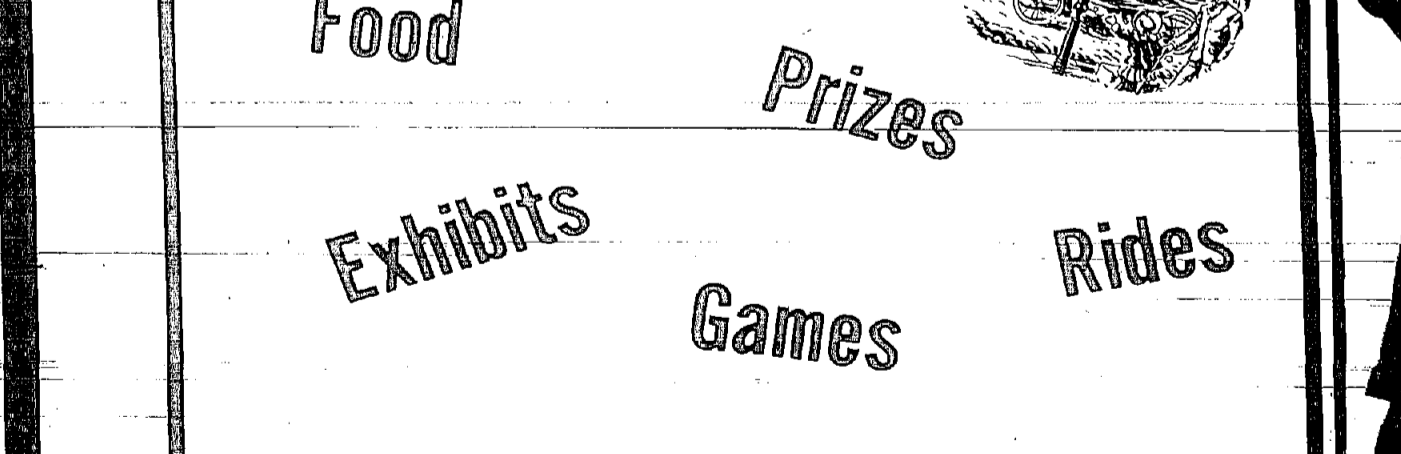

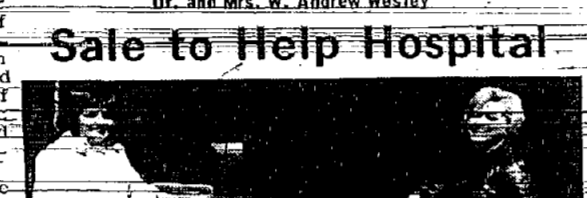

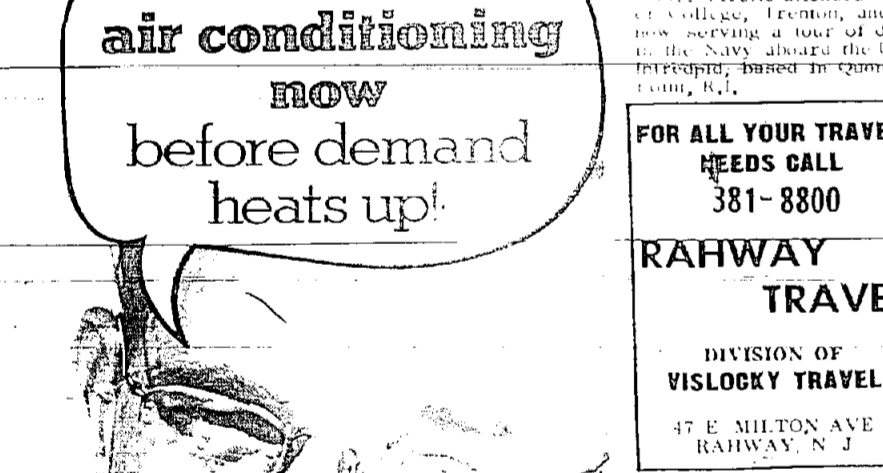
