



Moulton announced that Rahway will participate in a program making rapid, dependable air mai very the first national service goal of the The improved air mail service program is the first phase of a master plan for upgrading the postal system, Mr. Moulton said, other national service goals will be announced later. The service goal became effective April 22, Mr. Moulton said that, under the plan, AIP coded air mail deposited by 4 p.m. weekdays in conveniently located air-mail-only boxes will be delivered the next day in most principal and intermediate towns and cities within a 600-mile radious of Rahway, and in virtually any principal city in the continental Unified The improved air mail service program is the first phase of and in virtually any principal city in the continental United States within two days of deposit,
Postmaster Moulton said the following would be the exact locations for the air-mail-only boxes; Main Office, Pierce St., Rahway; Colonia Branch, Inman Ave., Colonia, and Lake Ave. and Orchard St., Clark, Postmaster General Winton M. Blunt said he expects every postal employee to join in meeting this challenge in order to achieve a performance of at least 95 per cent by July," Mr. Moulton said. "It will be the first of several major, definite plans that we have on the drawing board for comprehensive service improvements." The postmaster explained that the first national service goal will apply to nearly 500 towns and cities within airports and flight schedules that make next-day and second-day delivery possible. Rahway River Basin's Flood Problems Aired

The Army Corps of Engineers' public hearing on the prob-lems of flooding and water resources in the Rahway River basin resulted in both optimism and pessimism being expressed by those present in the Franklin School auditorium, Rahway. The goal of the April 27 meeting was outlined by Gol. James W. Barnett, district engineer, who stated that it was to exchange information so that possible solutions will be considered in full knowledge of public desires before submitting a plan to Congress.

Government officials, representatives throughout the basis aging director of the New area attended the meeting. Data-filled reports, personal accounts of flooding experiences, summaries of flood control efforts and a plea for speedy flood control action were heard.

Mayor Daniel L. Martin of Rahway, who reviewed the city's continued service to employhistory of flooding, urged that the survey be made quickly.

Col. Barnett explained that Phase I of the survey, hinded by

\$70,000, was in progress to determined if a more detailed survey was warranted. Timing would probably take two more years beyond fiscal 1972 for the final survey.

Proof of such need was strongly cited by Mayor Thomas A.

Kaczmarek of Clark who recommended a staged program of flood control improvements from downstream to program of

flood control improvements from downstream to upstream areas. He discussed water problems in the Pumpkin Patch brook section, referring also to the Middlesex Reservoir and Robinson's Branch of the river. Federal funds were requested because flood control costs would be too great a burden on he township.

This view also was emphasized by former Councilman-at-Large, William M. Weaver, who remarked, "The solution is beyond the capacity of the city itself," He pointed out that 50 to 60 miles of Rahway River basis has water coming through Rahway.

Aldes to Senator Clifford P. Case and Rep. Cornelius E. Gallagher stressed the need for the basin survey and offered help in securing future appropriations.

Encroachment problems along the Robinson's Branch were reviewed by Howard E. Street to Wheatena Park, under a separate small fund limited to \$1,000,000. Several such projects could be authorized under Section 205 of the 1948 Federal Flood Control Act. Councilman Richard J. Voynik expressed disappointment that his request for a federal fund to correct flooding by Brooks 6, 10, and 2, was rejected because the cost of over two-million dollars was too great in proportion to the benefit derived. Col. Barnett did offer hope that this area might be reconsidered from an entire basin plan point of view. Assemblyman Herbert II. Kiehn of Rahway spoke briefly on the Bill 1322 which he introduced to the State Legislature for increase of fines for unauthorized structures in rivers and streams. He praised the efforts of the strong Rahway flood group, as did Col. Barnett by recommending that other municipalities organize citizens' groups to facilitate commu-

nication, increased interest in water resource problems, and group pressure for federal funds.

Citizen action also was encouraged by Stanley Maisel, chief planner of the Army Engineers, who said neople get discouraged when they hear it will take years to get a project done, lie referred to past meetings in Rahway, when talking to RCFC members affer the meeting, explaining that if similar action had been taken in 1962, for example, "we do be that much ahead."

Councilman John J.
