and Senate conferees have agreed to an appropriation \_\_\_\_\_\_ of \$800,000 to begin work of the Rahway River South Branch flood control project in Rahway-The funds were incluc in the Public Works Appropriations bill for fiscal 1972 which passed both houses of Congress before the August recess. The report of the House-Senate conferees must be approved by both houses of Congress and the final version of the bill signed by the President before the measure becomes law. The \$800,000 added to the Senate measure at Senator Case's request is part of a special fund for flood control projects that cost under \$1 million. The total federal cost for the South Branch work is expected to be The South Branch project involved realignment and reshaping of the river channel as well as construction of levees and flood walls. The area has been subject to periodic flooding. The work is to be done by the Army Corps of Engineers in conjunction with the Department of Housing and Urban Development which will assist the city in an urbar renewal project on both side: of the South Branch Efforte to get the entire project under way began a number

Among the requirements are that the city submit to HUD an acceptable application for recertification of ts "workable program" (a master plan for urban action) and that the city make available adequate replacement housing for all families and individuals who would be uprooted by the project. Senator Case has been as-

sured by HUD officials that they stand ready to be of all possible assistance to the city in this regard. Senator Case said the Senate Appropriations Committee advised him the \$800,000 would be available to the project for a "reasonable" period -- perhaps a year or more. However, it was pointed out, if the project encounters lengthy delay, the funds could be lost to Rahway.

Cornelius E. Gallagher (D-13th District) said Senate conferees have agreed on increased appropriations, so Army engineers can move faster toward completion of general nvestigations on the Rahway


The conference agreement on the public works appropriatons bill, subject to final approval by the full House and Senate, would provide a total of \$35,000 for continued work on the feasibility study during the fiscal year ending next June 30. The Nixon administration's proposed budget had contained \$25,000, but Rep. Gallagher proposed this be Increased to \$40,000 after earning the engineers felt they could complete the study with that amount.

## 34.6% or 7,091 People, Eligible To Vote in City Are Unregistered

As Union County goes, so not registered which includes goes the state. That maxim could be applied to the state of registered voters in the Garden State.

Union County has about one-third (32.7%) of its population that is eligible to vote unregistered, just a little under the statewide performance (37.4%).

Of the 21 municipalities in Union Gounty, Mountainside has the lowest percentage, -10, of people eligible to vote who are unregistered. Tied for second are Springfield and New Providence with 21.6% unregistered. In third spot are Fanwood

and Berkeley Heights with 22.5%, and fourth rank goes to Clark, Rahway with 34.6% unregistered is slightly above the county average. The largest number of nonvoters who are eligible to

vote resides in Elizabeth, with 47.2% unregistered, and Plainfield, with 43.7% unregistered. Of the nine municipalities which have the lowest per-

centages of unregistered voters of those eligible, six are Republican strongholds, two consistently lean Republican, and one, Clark, tends to be Democratic The six are Mountainside, Fanwood, Westfield New

Providence Berkeley Heights and Cranford. The two communities which lean GOP are Scotch Plains and Spring-Countywide, there is a pos-

"These figures are necessarily only estimates," according to Dr. John C. Blydenburgh of Highland Park, director of the center. "They do not take into account shifts in our highly mobile population nor the results of recent registration drives, particularly those among the 18-20year-old group which has just won the right to vote. "Nevertheless, they give some guidelines to party leaders anxious to make elections more representative of the will of the maiority.

The center's report shows that more than 9,768,943 were not registered last year. This includes an estimated 1,432, 302 who were over 20 years of age in 1970 and 336,641

The medal will be presented to Mr. Johnson, who rescued a seven-year-old from drewning in the Middlesex Water Conquiny reservoir, by Leo Kahn, president of the Rahway club, Mr. Johnson also is a member of the Rahway Kiwanis Club. Mr. Johnson saved the life of Patricia Campbell of 25 Kent PL, Summit, who was skating on the ice of the reservoir when she through the ice into the water. Mr. Johnson was seated on a log on the reservoir. property with his wife and their two daughters when he leard someone scream, There's somebody in the water under the bridge."

Mr. Johnson, which ad one shoe off when he heard the scream, ran on the ice and went under the bridge, Feeling the ice cracking beneath his weight, he clung to the top of the bridge with one hand and used his other hand. to extend a hockey stick to the child who was flailing about in the water. The water at that point was more than six feet deep.

When the child was rescued and he had to leave the ice, Mr. Johnson was advised by others at the scene to run on the ice as fast as possible. Mr. Johnson ran across the crackling ice but was able to reach safety withut going in the water. The Connelly Medal is awarded by Kiwanis International to persons who risk their lives or physical harm on behalf of others when they "might just as well have passed along the way,"...

The medal is named after a young Chicago suburbanite Robert Connelly, who los his life in 1966 attempting to rescue a crippled woman who had fallen into the path of a passenger train. The -Kiwanis International board of trustees, in tribute to Connelly, established the medal "for service beyond the call of duty." The first medal was presented to Mr. Connelly's widow at the International convention in 1967 in Houston, lex. As a further tribute to Mr.

connelly, the medal has been awarded to others whose acts of heroism were in keeping with Mr. Connelly's example. Mr. Kahn said the nicdal is held in reverence and high esteem by Kiwanis Interna-
