





"What Is That In Your Hand?

EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is another in the series

of sermons by Rahway clergymen. This week's article was written by the Rev. Robert C. Powley, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Rahway. When the shepherd Moses was reluctant about becoming God's instrument in leading his people out of slavery, God put the question to him, "What is that in your hand?" 'A rod,'' Moses answered. In further conversation God directs Moses to throw the rod down upon the ground, whereupon, it becomes a snake, which when he picks it up by the tail returns to being a rod. 'Do you get the point?' says God. 'You do not need special credentials to prove to your countrymen that you have been called by the God of their fathers to deliver them from slavery. Just use what you have. And I know what you have in the way of resources in your hand, so you don't have to obtain anything special to do this job. Just commit what you have to this purpose to which I am calling you." It soon becomes apparent that this incident out of Hebrew history is a parable for man in any generation.

For, "what is already in his hand" man has so often overlooked as the resource for answering a need. meeting a commitment, fulfilling a responsibility, getting a job done. We tend to look for something or someone else before we recognize the "rod" in our own hand. Communities, organizations of every kind of description including churches, see what others are doing in other places, and "wish that we could do that," or "wish that we had that," or "wish that he or she was our leader." But God asks, "What is that in your hand?" You already may have the skill you need right in your midst. The talent may be right here. Don't overtook

. There may even be an untapped resource of money that is being overlooked. The answer to a need or a service is not always outside of ourselves. We ought If you follow the diaglogue between Moses and God, you will discover Moses trying to avoid God's call by many devious excuses. At one point Moses says: "Let Aaron do it! He can speak persuasively but not ne." Who among us does not readily identify with Moses at this point. For us it is not "Let Aaron do it," but rather, "Let George do it." I personally have never been able to discover who George, or what'shis-name, is. But I do know this about him. He must have some kind of supernatural shoulders to carry all the responsibilities that are passed his way. Do we try to get by as cheaply as we can, rather than being responsible according to our opportunity? Could it be that life does not pay greater dividends because we do not invest more of ourselves?
