

Navy Petty Officer Will Spend_Year At South Pote's Scientific Station

Navy Petty Officer First Class Fred R. Williams, son of Mrs. Ilar E. Caldwell of 1814 Patterson St., Rahway, will be spending the next year at the South Pole as part of the 17thconsecutive Operation Deep Freeze. Mr. Williams is a member of Detachment Alfa of the Antarctic Support Activities, which will leave soon for Deep Freeze Headquarters in Christchurch, New Zealand, enroute to the South Pole.

During Mr. Williams' year "on the ice," he will help support scientific research, aircraft flight coordination and and collection of weather data. Rigorous training preceded this assignment to Antarctica. He will arrive in Antarctica this month, the beginning of

the austral summer, a period of relatively non-violent weather. In March, other support units will withdraw, leaving his group "winter-over" through the sunless, six-month winter. Except for radio communications, he will remain isolated from the rest of the world until the following October. Mr. Williams is a graduate of Olive Hill High School,

The cost to the state's motorists for inspections and for work to put their cars in order has been estimated at \$100 million, he said. Service stations would have to spend \$30_million for equipment to repair ex-

haust systems, the assemblyman added. Assemblyman Kiehn also criticized the plan to give the motorist only two weeks in which to correct any fault found when his vehicle was tested. The motorist should be allowed a minimum of one month or even 60 days -in-which-to-have-corrective-

neasures taken, he said. The state's estimate of \$20 for a motor vehicle tuneup is unrealistic, Assemblyman Kiehn declared, noting that such tune-ups usually cost between \$40 and \$50. The cost probably will increase if service stations are compelled to buy testing equipment costing approximately \$6,000, he ad-



The Rahway Planning Board at its meeting on Sept. 28 voted unanimously to approve the Municipal Council's proposal to purchase the Elizabethtown Gas Company office building for use as a police headquarters. The Council at its Sept. 13 meeting introduced an ordinance to authorize payment of \$130,000 for the property at Central Avenue and Hamilton Street. 

Put an End to Waiting Games

Many supposedly public sessions of municipal bodies in Rahway and Clark have lately become a waiting game; when will the members come back from their long recesses

Delays in public meetings should be called only in dire emergencies, and the practice of making the public wait while board or council members are doing what they should have done at their executive sessions is highly impolite and disrespectful of taxpayer audiences. Rahway council has not made this scurry from public view its modus operandi, but the Clark council, the Clark Board of Education and the Rahway Board of Education have gone into long retreats at the expense of their citizen audiences.

Clark council has had 45 minute recesses at the beginning of several sessions. On one occasion, clapping by the audience, we feel, was the only thing that prompted a late return. The Rahway board went into recess to discuss prob-

lems with a group of youths at the September meeting. That should clearly be done after the meeting is over, or before it begins, whatever board members think advisable.

Usually there is an audience for the Rahway board monthly session, but at Clark board meetings, rarely a soul can be found. The last meeting was an exception however; five taxpayers were on hand, and the board promptly recessed for about one hour. Two of the citizens, we were told, had the stamina to remain to the end. Even our reporter had to leave to make a press deadline. Public meetings are held for the convenience of the

public, not body members. They are public, not private, and not filled with recesses. They are dedicated to enlightening the public about various community matters. There is no doubt in our minds that the members of these boards are by-and-large civicminded, but members should be reminded they serve at the pleasure of the public to whom they owe a modicum of good manners.

Newspapers-Voices of Free Men

There will be no brass bands and parades to signify the event. But Oct. 10-10 has been designated as National Newspaper Week. This year, the theme of the week will be "Newspapers--Growing with America."

During National Newspaper Week, editors must be forgiven if they blow their own horns a bit. For one week, they can offer rebuttal to the cynics who spend the other 51 weeks disagreeing and finding fault with the news or editorial views of the local newspaper. There are thousands of these newspapers in this country, and they stand as a symbol of the independence of our citizens. Beyond that, they are the one and only regularly printed record of the daily events in the life of a community. A community without a newspaper is little more than a name on a map or a collection of dry statistics in the archives of some courthouse. Newspapers are the breath of life. While we are reminded, during National Newspaper Week, that these newspapers are "Growing With America," it is well also to recall that growth without freedom would mean little -- and that newspapers are, in the final analysis, the voices of free men.

THE BOARD'S CORNER

Last June 12 the board sponsored a public meeting for the express purpose of giving everyone who wished an opportunity to say what they thought about our schools, what they are accomplishing and what they should be accomplishing.

The parents, taxpayers, students and teachers who came were divided into small groups so that all would have an equal opportunity to air their views. A summary of the small group discussions was then given to all at the end of the meeting.

The entire format was in accordance with the state board's "Our Schools" program. Begun in the spring of 1970, this program seeks to determine what the goals of our school system should be. Meetings have been held at both state and regional levels on an invitation basis. Rahway was the first school district in this area to hold a local meeting where everyone was encouraged to come and participate. The participants in our Hocal meeting were so

enthusiastic about the meeting that they voted over-whelmingly for an encore meeting in the fall. The board responded by scheduling the second meeting for Wednesday, Oct. 13, at 8 p.m. in Rahway Junior High School. The board has also responded in other ways by authorizing changes in the school program. These will be discussed in future columns.

Unfortunately, the publicity committee for these meetings has been handicapped by a lack of interest on the part of the daily press so many people have not heard about them. It is hoped, therefore, that those who do know will advise their friends and neighbors and encourage them to come and participate. In the final analysis the school system should reflect the values of the community. These are our schools, financed by our taxes for the benefit of our children. Which way do we go? The Oct. 13 meeting will help to provide the answer. For those who have something to say, now is the time to say it.

after a two-hour public hearing on an ordinance providing for the expenditure and a half-hour recess in which the Council members discussed the matter, Opposition to the purchase was led by Alonzo W. Lawrence of 1343 Madison Avenue, who said he spoke against the proposal in his own behalf and for the Rahway Taxpayers Association, Mr. Lawrence is the association's president. Two councilmen, Mrs.

Esther Forsythe and Peter M. Donovan, Republicans representing the Sixth and Fifth Wards respectively__ voted against the expenditure. Voting for the ordinance were four Democrats. John J. Gilgannon, Charles E. Crowell_Francis R. Senkowsky and Wilson D. Beauregard, and two Republicans, Richard J. Voynik and James R. Pickens. After the recess and be-

fore the vote was taken, Councilman Voynik stated that he would vote to buy the building from the Elizabethtown Gas Company because it could be sold by the city if necessary and that the purchase would represent an investment, Councilman Voynik then urged Mayor Daniel L. Martin and the Council "to look into a proposal" that a combined facility for municipal offices and police and fire headquarters be constructed at Central Avenue and Pierpont Street. Part of the property; formerly the site of Lincoln School, is occupied by the Rahway Free Public Library, which faces St. George Avenue, and the library's parking lot could be shared by the two city facilities, the councilman

said. Councilman Donovan then called for a referendum on the proposed purchase to give the voters the opportunity to decide whether to obtain the property of the gas company, Mayor Martin, in explain-

ing the proposed purchase. said Elizabethtown agreed to sell its building for \$130,000. The mayor added that the city would have to spend approximately \$400,000, to make the office building, a garage on the property and the parking <u>suitable for use as a</u> Department headquarters and as a Civil Defense and Disaster Control

Mayor Martin said alternate sites for a police headquarters have been considered. Use of the former Post Office on Esterbrook Avenue would require the expenditure of \$600,000 for renovation, he estimated. Mayor Martin also said the location of a City Hall and police and fire headquarters on a site in the redevelopment area was considered but that the cost would be

\$3 million. Location of CD headquarters in the Police Department building would make the city eligible for a \$75,000 federal grant, the
