Even though this amendment to the New Jersey Constitution has its flaws, we still recommend passage

It is Not Wrong to Teach Right

Two years ago, the daily, hour-long television program for pre-school children, "Sesame Street," appeared on American relevison with the purpose of preparing youngsters for the world of learning, regardless of whether they lived in slums, suburbs or urban affluence. The program is widely acclaimed in the United States and is continuing on both educational and commercial television.

In Britain "Sesame Street" is at the center of a dispute growing out of a decision by the governmentcontrolled, non-commercial British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) against using the program in its fall schedule.

The Bridsh objections to "Sesame Street" tell us a great deal about who is running BBC. Some chief obections were these: "Authoritarian aims" and too intent on changing children's behavior; too middleclass to respond to the needs of lowerclass children, present state? Monica Sima, head of the children's programming at BBC, said that the program's practice of demanding and praising "right answers" is an effort at indoctrination, "a dangerous use of television." She attacked the program's middle-class attitudes, its lack of reality and its attempt to prepare children for school but not

BBC's objections to the "pedagogical authoritarian-ism" of "Sesame Street" join those of American critics who feel the deliberate repetition of numbers, letters or words represent a traditional and authoritarian -approach to learning related to rote instruction. They attack funny sketches which try to promote such virtues as honesty and cleanliness, because this is an attempt to impose middle-classstandards on minorities. Chil-dren's behavior, they believe, must not be changed to conform to that of the middle class or virtuous standards. The street depicted on the program is too tame and therfore unreal, they say, with none of the grimeand crime of a real street. Militant blacks and radical -whites have complained that rather than teaching youngsters letters and numbers, television ought to stress the black identity. If "Sesame Street" is under fire for teaching "right

answers" about honesty and cleanliness most Americans will feel grateful to its producers for this program's positive contribution to the quality of American life.

In 197 control of the Council will be at stake when voters elect the six ward representatives. The Democrats gained control last year when Daniel L. Martin was elected mayor and three Democrats. Charles E. Crowell, Wilson Beauregard and Francis

R. Senkowsky, were elected councilmen-at-large. Councilman Donovan and Mr. Brogan, both in their thirties, waged strong camconcentrating house-to-house visits and distribution of campaign literature.

In his attempt to win Councilman Donovan's sear on the municipal body, Mr. Brogan attacked the Fifth Ward representative for what Mr. Brogan called the councilman's "'do nothing" record for his year in office. Councilman-Donovan concentrated his attack upon the Democratic administration, asserting that it was responsible for a tax increase of 23 per cent this year over the 1970 rate and for the addition of new jobs to the city payroll. After Mayor Martin challenged Mr. Donovan to list the jobs created since Jan. 1, the GOP councilman named the new positions and the salaries of

the city employees, and also declared tax funds had been misused because some em. ployees were paid before funds were appropriated in the 1971 budget. The purchase of the Elizabethtown Gas Co. building by the city for use as a


police headquarters was another issue in the campaign. Councilman Donovan opposed the purchase while Mr. Brogan backed the Council action.
