

Louis Bassano of Union, seeking two-year terms in the State Assembly in Tuesday's general election, defeated their two Democratic opponents and two Independent Coalition candidates. Assemblyman Kiehn was elected to his third two-year term. He and Mr. Bassano will represent Union County District 9-B, which was changed this year to consist of Rahway, Linden, Cranford, Union, Springfield, Garwood, Mountainside and Winfield. The district is considered by political experts to be one of the most evenly divided in New Jersey. The results supported that appraisal. Mr. Bassano topped the candidates, getting 27,906 votes, while Assemblyman Kiehn polled 27,382. Assemblyman Henry F. Gavan of Linden, Democrat, was third with 25,177 and his runningmate, Donald Lan of Springfield, fourth with 25,005. The Independent Coalition hopefuls were Melvin Charles of Linden and David K. 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

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

The Past and Future Are One

The downtown business area in Rahway has made some strides recently. About half a dozen vacant properties have been rented, and the new businesses are a step in the direction of commercial growth. But while nearly all the stores are filled with going businesses, the entire downtown area needs a coordinated improvement plan. In the Oct. 24 edition of the New York Times, their real estate section featured the downtown business area of Albia, lowa, and how it refurbished rows of Victorian structures that were falling into decay. The town of Albia, population 4,500, was founded in 1859, and most of its downtown center was built about 100 years ago. The merchants learned an important lesson: that "all change is not progress. They organized and spent a modest \$150,000 in a paint-and-fix-up operation dubbed Operation Facelift. Downtown Rahway is very similar to downtown Albia. The buildings are mostly of Victorian vintage or older

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

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

4. CONTROL METER AND SAMPLING MANHOLE

by the owner although conducted by the Township of Clark or its duly authorized representative.

(1) Industries permitted to connect to Township of Clark's sewers, even though not initially required to provide preliminary treatment, may be required to provide a control manhole and/or meter, as described above.

(1) Where the owner provides its own water supply, entirely separate from that supplied by the Township of Clark, or provides from its own sources a portion of the water consumed on the premises, which eventually finds its way into

the sewerage system of the Township of Clark, all aforementioned provisions will apply. This does not relieve the owner from the requirement to furnish, install and maintain a meter of the indicator-register-record type, to measure the discharge of industrial wastes, as provided herein. All costs of furnishing, installing and maintaining the industrial waste

flow meter will be borne by the owner.

(2) The Township of Clark's representative shall have access at reasonable times to industrial establishments and to any meters-used to determine waste volumes discharged into the sewer system or excluded from the sewer system.


