Insidious Bill Would Take Vote

Carl Marburger to override the decisions of local voters on acceptance or rejection of local school budgets. Indeed, it is only common sense that such a bill must be passed before February, 1972, when once again school budgets will be submitted to local electorates all over New Jersev. As in the case of Roselle, the State Commissioner

of Education holds in his hands more power than should reside in any appointed official. Under Title 18A, he can punish a school district for alleged "racial imbalance" or some other sin by withholding state aid funds at his own discretion. To prevent a recurrence of the authoritarian recrimination exercised against Roselle, Senator Frank X. McDermott drafted S. 2298 "to prohibit withholding of state school aid funds from a school district during the pendency of any administrative or judicial proceedings or appeal instituted by the district." This bill, which will be re-introduced in the "lame duck" session of the legislature, merits vocal grassroots support. Many feel that this bill, while commendable, does

not go far enough and that it is necessary for the egislature to invalidate many sections of Title 18A from which derive Mr. Marburger's excessive powers. Since Title 18A is said to be 'out of print," the average voter has to go to his local Board of Education office to consult it. Once he does so, he will be appalled at the scope of the commissioner's jurisdiction. Is

#### What Should Schools **Teach Our Children?** By James F. Kernan Rahway Board of Education cation Committee Chairman

This may seem a strange question to be asking more than 300 years after the first public school law was passed in this country. Yet it is the central point

in education today. During the past generation, the role of the schools has been expanded well beyond the limits of traditional education, and costs have risen accordingly. However, taxpayers have been reacting to these increased costs by voting down school budgets and also insisting upon some accounting from the schools relative to what they

are actually accomplishing. Obviously something has to give. Either the schools must be given sufficient funds to do all that is expected of them, or they are entitled to some set of priorities to guide them in the use of the limited funds made available. Seeking a resolution of this dilemma is the point of the "Our Schools" meetings. At the board's Oct. 13 meeting, all participants were given a list of 12 general goals of education based

upon the state board's list of tentative goals. All were asked to indicate which four they would hold the schools most accountable for and which four they would hold the schools least accountable. The 82 persons who responded included 16 teachers, 10 studente and 56 citizons, who were neither students or teachers. The results are as follows.

Schools are most accountable for these goals of learning: (a) mastering basic skills of reading, writing and arithmetic; (b) learning basic facts of history, geography, science, etc.; (c) enjoying learning and appreciating its value in life, and (d) learning to communicate effectively with others.

learning: (e) learning the responsibilities of family life; (f) learning to promote public and private health; (g) developing a set of personal ethics and values, and (h) becoming an effective participant in the political process.

And in the process of working with constant renewal, we receive a perspective which shows some of the possibilities of the fulness of living which have been intended for us. --- To be realistic we must recognize the tension which

exists. It will always be a part of life, but God will not let that-tension be our excuse nor will he let us go down in defeat. He has shown us that life is victorious over death, that His will will triumph over those who oppose Him. For this reason His people will fear neither death nor life, All things belong to Him, and He will remain responsible for His Creation. To live fully means to be a slave to nothing that opposes the goodness of God. This hope is with us because God claims the final victory.
