

giving Day, said John Pit-chell, Jr., president. **New Ordinance Controls Excessive Tree Cutting** An ordinance to regulate indiscriminate cutting of trees in Rahway and to protect the growth of trees was adopted by the Municipal Council.

The ordinance applies to all persons or corporations applying for building permits for more than one dwelling or for a permit for a dwelling to be erected as part of an uncompleted development.


The law was enacted because indiscriminate and excessive cutting of trees on tracts of land has caused increased surface water drainage and more soil erosion, the ordinance A plan, prepared by a licensed engineer or land surveyor, must show the locations of trees to be removed and must pe submitted to the city before a building permit is issued. The regulations prohibit the cutting of any trees in excess of three inches in diameter unless the trees would cause hardship and endanger the public or adjoining property owner; the trees are in the area to be used for a building, driveways

or recreation area, or the area has a cut or fill of land
