of \$60 million to school districts next year. The measure was sponsored by Senate President Raymond H. Bateman of Somerset County. The bill will go to Gov. William T. Cahill for his signature. The Assembly ap-

proved the bill last week. Mr. Boch said that the estimate on Rahway's share was given by Richard M. Nash, superintendent of schools. Gov. Cahill had recommenied that state aid to school districts be frozen at this year's level of \$30 million. The recommendation was made on the advice of his Policy Study Committee which is looking for new ways o structure the state's tax

Mr. Boch said that he favors using the additional \$100. 000 in state money to offset an increase in the local property tax. He explained that the funds should be used for operating expenses of the school system and not for expanding programs designed to "eat up" the additional money which would be received if the governor signs the state aid measure.


Song Festival Planned For Saturday Night
