The purchase must be made with the realization that the good that is accomplished by the purchase--prevention of additional runoff which causes floods, added recreational areas, and much needed open space--costs, it doesn't pay in terms of profits. The other golf sites make money only because the land was purchased at a time when real estate values were considerably lower. Mayor and Freeholder-elect Thomas A. Kaczmarek of Clark has warned very properly in an article in this issue that money must be sought immediately. There is also the possibility that state and federal monies will not be forthcoming for the purchase, then Clark should consider purchase of, at least, some of the property for recreation, while the remainder is developed. This alternative might have to be considered. The township let this land remain industrially zoned

for seven years and part of the difficulty now encountered results from a lack of foresight by the township. It should also be made clear that the "appraisal" obtained by the park commission is low. Even if the land were developed residentially, two homes can be constructed per acre, including access space, and with for prices going between \$15,000 and \$20,000, probably the latter, in the First Ward, that means a per acre cost of \$40,000, a rough estimate, not an appraisal. Aspects of Freedom in Local Schools Edward J. Higgins, a member of the Rahway Board of Education, warned citizens at the Nov. 20 meeting of the board that the initiation of state educational programs in the local school systems could mean financial disaster for those systems in the future when state funds for the initiated programs are dropped, leaving local taxpayers to foot the bill. Most of these programs are clearly non-essential. In fact, most of them are passed because vocal specialinterest groups manage to corner a sufficient number of state legislators into funding their pet projects. The New Jersey Education Association, just like a manufacturers' trade group, is always promoting schemes to enhance the pockets of its members which may or may not be in the best interest of the state and its communities. Specialized programs mean high-paid personnel, more dues, greater influence -- it's the Parkinson's Law of

the educationalist establishment. Mr. Higgins' comments were directed at the motion to apply for funding of a program in the high school to set up high school equivolency for 1972-73 at no cost to the participants, no matter what their economic background. The cost to the board is one-third of the total cost of approximately \$8,600. Mr. Higgins pointed out well that the participants can afford to pay, and the general taxpayers should not be forced to provide funds for special individual improvements which are not mandated by state law.
