Delayed by Staff Shortage

Union County Prosecutor Karl Asch stated this week that investigation of contract and purchasing records of the City of Rahway has been delayed because of a manpower shortage in the prosecutor's office. The prosecutor said the lack of manpower is hampering

the investigation of complaints of corruption in several Union County municipalities and also is eausing delays in ____ a professional employee of probes, including the one of Rahway's records, already in progress. Contract and purchasing records for the City of Rahway

for the past six years were removed from City Hall to the prosecutor's office in Elizabeth late last month. The records were subpoenaed by Prosecutor Asch's office. The prosecutor declined at that time to comment, saying that it is not his policy to "discuss matters under investigation." "No one knows what they're looking for," Mayor Daniel L.

Martin of Rahway commented last month. "There is nothing to hide; we will cooperate." Mayor Martin added that City Clerk Robert W. Schrof, as the keeper of the municipal records, was ordered to turn over the records to the county. Delay in the investigation of allegations of corruption in the City of Linden also has resulted because of the staff shortage. The prosecutor said that the special grand jury which has been investigating Linden's affairs has been recessed until early February. He added that the recess was ordered 'because we simply need time to prepare sufficient material, go over voluminous records and interview witnesses." Prosecutor Asch continued, "That grand jury should meet four or five times a week, but we just do not have enough men to do the job. We are continuing at a pace that benefits those who are being investigated."

Prosecutor Asch said that his office has received complaints of alleged corruption in several other Union County-municipali------by Raymond-Brown and later ties but, with the increased workload, attempts to prove those harges have been stalled.

The prosecutor added that his office is processing twice the olume of cases it handled two years ago and is simply 'straining and stretching to handle the extroadinary tide of ordinary cases," ranging from narcotics abuse to murder. Recently the prosecutor asked the Board of Freeholders for an emergency appropriation for more personnel, equipment and pay raises for his present staff. The request was turned down because it was considered by the board that it was not of an emergency nature.

Purchase Land Near River With NJ Funds, RCFC Says

In an effort to stop "indiscriminate" building in flood hazard areas, the Rahway Citizens for Flood Control, Inc. recommended to several councilmen this week that the City of Rahway retain and acquire all available lands that border on the Rahway River and its tributaries.

These lands can be converted for recreational purposes and flood water retention basins; indeed, some such lands have served as natural "containers" of flood waters even before the city's founding, group president, Howard E. Baker, pointed out. "The city should not put up for sale any land that it owns along the South Branch of the Rahway River on the Woodbridge line, and no permit should be granted for placing a culvert here that would spill tons of more water from the proposed 519-unit apartment complex on Leesville Avenue in Woodbridge Township," Mr. Baker said. This subject was also discussed at a special meeting held

last Wednesday, Dec. 22, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Dickes, 505 Central Ave., Rahway. Purpose of the meeting was to find legal means of restraining the Sisto Bros., who started massive land filling on their block-size property bordering on the Robinson's branch of the Rahway River between Church Street and St. George Avenue, spokesmen for the RCFC stated. This land has always been a natural flood water retention basin and should remain so, according to the RCFC, Possible purchase from the owners, Sisto Bros.

was suggested. "Such land should be condemned and purchased with Green Acre-funds. The city should immediately pass ordinances to supplement state laws and forbid any more building in flood ains," Mr. Baker emphasized. As a result of this meeting, RCFC group attorney, George Bartell, was engaged to secure a restraining order on future ill by Sisto Bros, and will strive to have present fill removed cfore the spring flood season. Added funds were contributed or this cause by 35 Robinson's branch area residents. Approxi-

mately 150 families belong to the Rahway flood group.
