





Silver Center Displays World's Heaviest Coin

"The world s most beautiful medal" (and the world's largest and heaviest silver coin are the latest additions to the National State Bank's display of limited issue medals, coins and ingots at the bank's silver center in the Rahway office, 1420 Irving Both the Waterloo Medal

and the 20 Balboas coin from the Republic of Panama were struck from sterling silver under the auspices of the <u>Franklin Mint, the world's</u> largest private mint. The Waterloo Medal was created more than 100 years

ago by the great Italian medalist, Benedetto Pistrucci, who also created the "St. George and the Dragon" design for British coinage. Pistrucci designed and created the Waterloo Medal to commemorate Wellington's great victory over Napoleon in 1815. Because the original dyes were actually considered too valuable to harden, the medal

was never struck from the original dyes. The sterling silver medal was finally struck from soft copper impressions of the original dyes made by John Pinches, Medallists Ltd. of England, an affiliate of the Franklin Mint. At 2 1/2inches in diameter, the new copper dyes are slightly smaller than the originals. The medal--limited in its minting to only 5,000 units-can be purchased at the local National State Bank office. The central motif on the face of the Waterloo Medal is profile busts of four sovereigns whose alliance overthrew Napoleon, the Prince Regent, later King George IV of England; Francis II of Austria, Alexander of Russia and Frederick William III of Prussia. The outer border which frames these
